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Stockbridge-Munsee is Proactive with New Subdivision Planning

Last winter the Stockbridge-Munsee Community hired consulting engineering firm R.A. Smith National to address the Tribe's need for housing. For a decade now, the Tribe has planned to build two subdivisions north and south of County Highway A, just west of the Stockbridge-Munsee Health and Wellness Center. The proposed subdivision south of County Highway A would utilize the existing streets of Elm Road and Koan Tuk Drive as its two roadways. The name for this site is the Koan Tuk Subdivision. The name means "Pine Place." On the east side of Elm Street is Ah-Toh-Wuk Circle, which contains an established subdivision of houses, trailer homes, apartment buildings, a water tower, and a playground. At the end of Koan Tuk Drive is the Stockbridge-Munsee Environmental office building.

North of the Environmental Department on the other side of Highway A is the other proposed neighborhood, Taconic Subdivision. Taconic means "In the Forest." This site is roughly one and a half times the size of the Elm Road and Koan Tuk area.

In 2004, Nordin-Peterson Engineerin was hired to plat the subdivision, including infrastructure. The project was stalled due to legal cases regarding treaty rights and land-to-trust. Approximately eight years later the land was put into trust.

Public meetings were conducted regarding these proposed subdivisions with representatives from R.A. Smith National facilitating the meetings: Jeff M. Mazanec, Senior Project Manager; Christopher D. Hitch, Project Manager; and Tom Mortensen, Landscape Architect/Site Planner. The Koan Tuk and Taconic Subdivisions have also been discussed at Environmental, Housing, Land, and CORE Planning meetings for half a year.

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Title: Failed/Late Arrival of Scheduled Dental Appointments

Purpose: The purpose of this policy is to maximize the availability and improve access of appointments, improve patient/department communication and hold patients accountable for failed appointments. The intent is to reduce the number of failed appointments that negatively impact the availability of care that can be offered to other community members at the Stockbridge-Munsee Health and Wellness Center (SMHWC).

Policy: It is the policy of the dental department at the SMHWC that patients who fail two (2) times in one twelve (12) month period will forfeit the privilege of scheduling appointments in advance for a period of one (1) year. Patients seeking emergency care services will be triaged. Any patient with true emergent needs will be scheduled to receive treatment for that need. The failure of one (1) preparation appointment for specialized care is considered the rejection of that care for a period of one (1) year. The failure of three (3) delivery appointments for specialized care or the refusal to schedule a delivery appointment within 120 days of the preparation appointment is considered the rejection of the specialized care and will result in the patient being liable for lab costs associated with such care.

Definitions:

Failed Appointment can be any one of the following:

- a. Failing to show up for a scheduled appointment in the Dental Department;

- b. Failing to show up for a referred appointment with an outside provider;

- c. Arriving more than 10 minutes late for an appointment without notifying the department.

Procedure:

1. The dental department will place confirmation phone calls to all scheduled patients. At the confirmation call the staff will confirm the appointment (if possible), inform the patient of the existence of a failed appointment policy that could restrict their ability to schedule appointments in the future.
2. After the first failed appointment, the patient will be sent notification of their failed appointment and a copy of the policy. They will also be given a courtesy call to remind them of the policy and the consequences of failing a second appointment.
3. The failed appointment and subsequent communications will be documented in the patient's electronic dental record.
4. After the second failed

appointment, a certified letter will be mailed to the patient to inform them that they have failed two appointments in the last 12 months and their scheduling privileges are being revoked for a period of one year from the date of the second failed appointment.

5. The dental department will maintain a list of patients who are revoked from scheduling advance appointments and the date the patients scheduling privileges can be resumed.
6. Crowns, and bridges, and full and partial dentures are specialized care. The time taken to prepare for a crown, bridge, or denture could be used to provide basic care to a different patient. Therefore, a failure of one crown/bridge preparation (initial impressions for dentures) appointment is considered a rejection of the specialized care. Patients who fail these preparation/initial appointments are considered to have rejected the treatment and will give up the privilege of receiving a crown/bridge/denture for one year. After failing three appointments for the delivery of a crown, bridge, or denture, or the refusal to schedule an appointment for delivery in a 3 month period will result in the patient being responsible for the lab fees

associated with their crowns, bridges, or dentures.

Implementation:

1. No advance scheduled appointments for one year after the second failed appointment.
2. To protect patients from acquiring a second inadvertent failed appointment, any series of previously scheduled appointments will be cancelled after the first failed appointment.
3. Revoked patients will be placed on a "short call" list and offered short notice appointments when they become available.
4. If you notify us that you are running late and we are able to accommodate your late arrival you will not be charged with a failed appointment.
5. A dental emergency is defined as a tooth or mouth condition in which there is pain and/or swelling. Patients with dental emergencies should call 715-793-5019 to be given a timely triage appointment. This appointment time is designated for triage and emergency care. Routine treatment, such as permanent fillings, cannot be expected during this time.

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Bowler Post Office Stamps Out Hunger

Letter Carriers collect 1,302 pounds of food from community

Bowler, WI – Letter carriers at the Bowler Post Office along with postal employees and local volunteers teamed up once again to stamp out hunger in the community.

Across the country, the National Association of Letter Carriers (NALC) Food Drive – held in cooperation with the Postal Service – resulted in millions of pounds of non-perishable food collected and distributed to deserving charities nationwide.

Closer to home, the Bowler carriers collected 1,302 pounds of food from generous donations left at mailboxes, which were then delivered to local community food pantries.

“For 21 years our letter carriers, volunteers and neighbors have come together for this important community event,” said Bowler Postmaster Elizabeth Int-Hout. “This clearly shows the generosity of our customers and the commit-

ment of our employees to make a difference in people’s lives.”

According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, more than 50 million Americans are food insecure, meaning they live at risk of hunger. Perhaps most alarming is the fact that nearly 17 million children in America are struggling with hunger. Stamp Out Hunger — the nation’s largest one-day food drive — collects non-perishable food to help more than 37 million people, who face hunger every day in America.

Partners for this year’s drive were the Campbell Soup Company, Feeding America, United Way, AFL-CIO, Valpak, AARP, Uncle Bob’s Self Storage, and the National Rural Letter Carriers’ Association.

The Postal Service receives no tax dollars for operating expenses and relies on the sale of postage, products and services to fund its operations.

Tips from Former Smokers

IHS has joined the national CDC tobacco education campaign, “Tips from Former Smokers” to help deter the use of commercial tobacco in Indian Country.

The health consequences of smoking are staggering; each year, an estimated 443,000 people die prematurely from smoking, and an estimated 49,000 of these smoking-related deaths are a result of secondhand smoke exposure. And the consequences are even more dramatic in Indian Country:

- American Indians and Alaska Natives (AI/AN) have the highest prevalence of smoking and other tobacco use of any population group in the United States.
- According to the National Center for Health Statistics, 17.8 percent of AI/AN women smoked during their pregnancy, compared to 13.9 percent of non-Hispanic white women. Tobacco use during pregnancy is one of the key preventable causes of adverse pregnancy outcomes.
- Nationally, Native American youth living on reservations have the highest smokeless tobacco use of all U.S. population groups. Smokeless tobacco can cause

cancer of the esophagus, mouth, and pancreas.

• Cardiovascular disease is the leading cause of death among AI/ANs, and tobacco use is an important risk factor. Cancer is the second leading cause of death among AI/ANs nationally, and lung cancer is the leading cause of cancer death.

Most smokers—nearly 70%—say they plan to quit and half make a serious attempt for a day or longer each year. The «Tips from Former Smokers» campaign was designed to create a sense of immediacy about the damage smoking causes to encourage people to stop smoking now or not to start.

Please help us spread the message throughout Indian Country about the benefits of quitting and not starting the use of commercial tobacco products.

Thank you for your immediate attention to this important health issue and thank you again for your great care of the American Indian and Alaska Native population.

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



meeting on December 4, 2012, Jeff Mazanec showed displays of the original projected Koan Tuk and Taconic Subdivision housing assignments, which Nordin-Peterson Engineering Company had mapped out to have 28 housing lots on the north site and 12 housing lots on the south site.

Mazanec, however, did not wish to be limited to what developers proposed almost ten years ago. Tom Mortensen, the site planner for the project, said, "Let's take a look at this property and let's understand what the land is telling us. We have this site plan that you've all seen with the lot sites on it and how many lots, and the density of it, but I think we need to kind of back away from that. I don't want to get too fixed up on that original layout. I think what we want to do here is give a real fresh perspective to this existing site, and maybe get a little bit more creative on some of the ways we can overcome some of the challenges. Maybe create a better environmental layout from a quality of life standpoint. Maybe respect some of the terrain, respect some of the vegetation, and not just pretend these lot lines dropped out of space and landed there and that's what we have to work with."

The attendees at the first meeting discussed putting in apartment complexes, clustered housing [condominiums, townhouses, or duplexes], parks, walking trails, and community gardens. Whether or not houses could have basements in certain areas was examined as well.

Sympathies go out to the families of those who just recently passed away:

Mildred Blazer, 91 years old of Bark River, Michigan and last, but most certainly not least, Virginia "Gin" Johnson, 99 years old of the Stockbridge-Munsee Community who passed away on May 3rd. Gin was one of six children born to George and Laura Mohawk. She is survived by four children Verna, Bonnie, Mary, and Leonard Jr. "Dooner" and one son George preceded her in death. She has 26 grandchildren and over sixty great and great-great grandchildren.

The elders received a Tribal blanket from the Tribe and the elders and their families were treated to a meal provided by the staff at Pine Hills Supper Club. The smiles on the faces of the families of the elders and the elders themselves made the event truly memorable for everyone in attendance.

Project Manager Christopher Hitch explained how the terrain, soil, and gravity flow would affect sanitation and frost protection for pipes.

Hitch said, "Knowing that we've got very sandy soil here, what can we get for service and frost protection without doing any manipulation of the land or any engineered sort of solution to frost protection just using the cover?" He continued, "Given the existing depth of gravity sewer, the mainline sewer, and from the points of connection where it meets the lot, what are the areas outside of the property, outside of the right a way, that you can achieve a gravity service without the need for some sort of manipulated or other frost protection measure?"

The various types of homes that could be built on these sites, such as split-level homes, houses with basements, or homes on concrete slabs, was then discussed. Scott Vele, Tribal Councilperson, said, "From my perspective, I will not vote to approve for anything that doesn't have what modern subdivisions off the reservation have as far as basements, proper drainage, and proper protection from frost. People will have to live there for 20 or 30 years."

One of the controversial topics discussed at the public meetings was the entrance of the Koan Tuk Subdivision. Currently, Koan Tuk Drive stems off of Elm Road and dead ends right before County Highway A. If this street does not connect to the highway, then homeowners at the end of this road will have to drive a mile and a half to get to their homes and a mile and a half to get back onto the highway. This three mile roundtrip may seem tedious for those whose lawns back up to the highway, especially during snowstorms. However, it was argued by some of the tribal members that having only one entrance into the Koan Tuk Subdivision was safer for children, recreational vehicle enthusiasts, and drivers during rush hour.

On the other hand if Koan Tuk Drive opened to County Highway A, then the two subdivisions would be connected by a straight-a-way. The Shawano County Highway Department informed the Tribe that in order to have turn lanes with this four-way intersection more development would have to be included. R.A. Smith National, along with some of the members of the Tribal Council, proposed that the area where the Environmental building currently resides should be the place where the new central office building is constructed. This central facility would include all of the Tribal departments under one roof with the exception of the Stockbridge-Munsee Health and Wellness

Center and the North Star Mohican Casino Resort departments.

Jeff Mazanec believed both proposed subdivisions should be connected by a straight road on either side of Highway A. He said, "Right now it's a bisected community in terms of this subdivision verses that one. I think long term and good planning would tell us you really want to connect these. Not only from a safety standpoint but from a community standpoint. It's just more logical to have these kinds of connections for the community. From a traffic standpoint, a staggered intersection is generally more dangerous."

A few community members did not like the idea of having a large office complex in a residential subdivision. They argued that many people who reside on the reservation prefer to live in a country-style atmosphere rather than be near a government office. Some of the homeowners who live near the central office building would probably consider their neighborhood to have too much infrastructure.

By the end of these meetings, two sets of alternatives were proposed for each subdivision but a consensus could not be reached. During the May 7, 2013 Tribal Council meeting, the Tribal Council voted to approve the alternatives that offered the most flexibility for each neighborhood. They approved a combination of both alternatives for the Taconic Subdivision, which included three two-unit town homes, 17 single family homes, 2 mobile homes, a terraced community garden and orchard, a Native tree buffer, and a park shelter with picnic tables and a play structure. For the Koan Tuk Subdivision, the Tribal Council chose the alternative that included three eight-unit apartment buildings and three mobile homes near the proposed centralized office complex that will have a 17,000-22,000 sf footprint. A neighborhood park will connect the office complex with the apartment buildings. There will also be an additional three pre-assigned homes near the intersection of Elm Street and Koan Tuk Drive.

Securing money for the types of houses being proposed is still being considered as well. Chad Miller, Land Management Technician, said, "We're trying to be proactive instead of reactive in our planning. We're trying to do that '10 year plan,' so that in a few years if somehow money becomes available, we don't say, 'We got some money to build. Where are we going to go with this?' Instead, we've got a plan put together that gives us strong guidelines for future development. A lot of times we're not proactive, we're reactive. We don't plan ahead until we've got the money in our pocket."

Tick Bite

What are ticks?

Ticks are small wingless bugs that feed on the blood of animals, birds, and people. They have 8 legs and are related to spiders and mites. There are many different kinds of ticks. Black-legged ticks, or deer ticks, are usually tiny, no bigger than the head of a pin. Wood and dog ticks are usually much larger.

How do tick bites occur?

Tick bites occur most often during early spring to late summer. Ticks are found among plants and on animals in low-lying brush in woodlands, grasslands, and marshlands and at the seashore. Wild birds and animals, as well as domestic animals and pets such as dogs, horses, and cows, can carry ticks. Ticks may climb on humans from animals, leaf litter, or low-lying brush. Ticks wait in the underbrush for an animal or human to walk by, and then grasp the fur or skin and crawl up the leg. Ticks cannot jump or fly. They wander the body for 30 minutes to an hour before inserting their feeding parts into the skin.

Can I get sick from a tick bite?

Most ticks do not carry diseases, and most tick bites do not cause serious health problems. But it is important to remove a tick as soon as you find it. Rarely are the diseases transmitted if the tick is removed within the first 24 hours after it attaches. Removing the tick's body helps you avoid diseases the tick may pass on during feeding.

However, some ticks carry infections that can be passed to people. For example, deer tick bites may cause Lyme disease. The early symptoms of Lyme disease occur within the first week to months after being bitten by an infected tick. These include flu-like symptoms and a rash that resembles a bulls-eye or target located on one area of the skin. A bite from other ticks such as the wood tick or dog tick may cause Rocky Mountain spotted fever (RMSF). RMSF may first cause flu-like symptoms and then a pink or red spotted rash.

How are tick bites treated?

If you find a tick attached to your body, you need to remove it. You can remove it yourself or get help from your healthcare provider. To remove an attached tick:

- Grasp the tick with tweezers as



(Deer Tick)

close to the skin as possible.

- Gently pull the tick straight away from you until it releases its hold. Pulling the tick out too quickly may tear the body from the mouth, leaving the mouth still in the skin.

If you are unable to remove the tick completely, you may need to see your healthcare provider.

- Do not twist the tick as you pull, and try not to squeeze its body. Squeezing or crushing the tick could force infected fluids from the tick into the site of the bite.

After you have removed the tick, thoroughly wash your hands and the bite area with soap and water. Put an antiseptic such as rubbing alcohol where you were bitten.

Save the tick in case you later start having symptoms of disease and need to know what kind of tick bit you. Put the tick in a clean dry jar, small plastic bag, or other sealed container and keep it in the freezer. Identification of the tick may help your provider diagnose and treat your symptoms. If you do not have any symptoms of disease after 1 month, you can discard the tick.

If you do develop symptoms seek medical attention. Lyme disease is treated with antibiotics. Early treatment can help prevent possible complications.

How can I take care of myself?

If you find a tick on your body, remove it right away. Check for a rash and other symptoms for about 4 weeks after the bite.

Call your healthcare provider if:

- A tick has bitten you and you think the tick may be a deer tick.
- You develop a bulls-eye rash or a rash with tiny purple or red spots.
- The area of the bite becomes more swollen or painful or drains pus, or you see red streaks spreading from the wound.
- You have flu-like symptoms after a bite such as fever, headache, muscle aches, joint pain or swelling, and a general feeling of illness.

How can I prevent tick bites?

- Be aware of the areas where ticks live. Do not walk, camp, or hunt in the woods of tick-infested areas without precautions.
- In areas of thick underbrush, try to stay near the center of trails.
- When you are outdoors, wear

Per Tribal Code, Food Handler's Training and a Food Sales Permit is a requirement prior to selling food products within the Stockbridge Munsee Community.

Food Handler's training is made available six different times a year. Training is for anyone interested in safe food handling or planning to work a future food sale. This requirement does not apply to pot lucks or other events where food products are not being sold.

For first time Food Handler's as well as the experienced Food Handler's that need to renew their training (*which is every 2-years*) you must register to attend one of the above listed trainings.

long-sleeved shirts tucked into your pants. Wear your pants tucked into your socks or boot tops if possible. A hat may help, too. Wearing light-colored clothing may make it easier to spot the small tick before it reaches your skin and bites.

- Use approved tick repellents on exposed skin and clothing. Do not use more than recommended in the repellent directions. Do not put repellent on open wounds or rashes. Wash the spray off your hands. Be careful with children because the repellents can make them ill.

DEET is a very effective repellent, but adults should use products with no more than 35% DEET. Children should use repellents with no more than 10% DEET. DEET should be washed off your body when you go back indoors.

- Treat household pets for ticks and fleas. Check pets after they have been outdoors.
- Brush off clothing and pets before entering the house.
- After kids play outside, check their skin – especially the scalp, behind the ears, the neck, under the arms, and the groin.
- After you have been outdoors, undress and check your body for ticks. Check your clothes. Wash them to remove any ticks.
- Shower and shampoo after your outing.
- Inspect any gear you have carried outdoors.

Treatment of Lyme Disease

Most tick bites are not due to deer ticks, and most deer ticks don't carry Lyme disease, so it isn't necessary to treat every tick bite with antibiotics, which may have side effects, such as increased chance of sunburn.

A single dose of the antibiotic doxycycline taken within 48 hours after a tick bite reduces the chance of catching Lyme disease by about 70%.

Antibodies against the bacteria that causes Lyme disease doesn't show up in the blood until about 3 weeks after catching the infection. If a full 10 to 21 day course of antibiotics is started before antibodies are present, the antibodies may never appear, so it will never be certain if Lyme disease was caught.

The symptoms of early Lyme disease, including flu type symptoms and the bull's eye rash, clear up whether or not antibiotics are taken then. Those symptoms don't clear up any faster if antibiotics are prescribed immediately after the tick bite.

The reason for starting antibiotics, after Lyme disease is confirmed by the presence of antibodies, is to prevent the heart, brain and arthritis problems that are caused by long term Lyme disease. There is no advantage in starting antibiotics before the antibodies are present, they work just as well if delayed until antibodies are detected and the infection is confirmed.

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
