



Constitution Revision Update

(Editor's Note: The following information has been provided to the Mohican News by the Constitution Committee and is written in response to a letter they received from the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) which offered technical comments on the proposed amendments to the Stockbridge-Munsee Constitution):

To the Editor:

We are writing to update the community on the pending amendments to the Stockbridge-Munsee Constitution. Those amendments have received enough signatures for a Secretarial Election to be held.

The Stockbridge-Munsee Tribal Council has requested the Bureau of Indian Affairs to hold a secretarial election on proposed amendments to the Tribe's Constitution. Those amendments would: 1) lower the voting age from 21 to 18; 2) remove the BIA from the constitution amendment process and 3) allow all tribal members to vote regardless of residency.

On May 16, 2013 the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) offered technical comments on the proposed amendments to the Stockbridge-Munsee Constitution. The BIA states that the proposed amendments do not contradict federal law and that a Secretarial Election can go forward upon request from the Tribal Council. We have reviewed the BIA's comments and we believe the

Seventh Annual Senior Health Fair

Elderly Services recently hosted its Seventh Annual Senior Health Fair with over 20 vendors from Stockbridge-Munsee Departments as well as outside vendors. ThedaCare at Home sponsored the event providing a luncheon of sandwiches, salads and cookies from Bonnies Place.

Stockbridge-Munsee Departments with booths included Elderly Services, Family Services, Division of Community Housing, Public Safety, Stockbridge-Munsee Health and Wellness Center's Community Health Nurse, Nutrition and Diabetes Programs, and the Mohican Family Center.

Other vendors included ThedaCare at Home, Southern Care Hospice, State of Wisconsin Office for the Blind and Visually Impaired, Great Lakes Intertribal Council, Social Security, Clear

Sounds, Aging and Disability Resource Centers of Wisconsin, Independent Mobility Plus, Board on Aging and Long Term Care, Elder Resource Directory, Oneida Market, Options for Independent Living, Frontier, Homme Home, Kindred Hearts Senior Living, College of Menominee Nation, Wisconsin Department of Veterans Affairs, and Kindred Hearts Senior Living.

DeNasha invited representatives from the booths up to say a few words about their services. Paul Clocko from Clear Sounds explained that the products they provide are sound enhanced phones and audio listening equipment for music and speech that are designed for clarity and enhanced hearing. "If you are hearing impaired, you can receive this equipment at no cost," he advised.



Mary Lapp, Respiratory Therapist

Vicki Johnson with Kindred Hearts Senior Living, advised that they work with seniors to give them options available for senior living facilities. "Not necessarily at our facility, we just want to help you find the fit that's right for your needs." Johnson said.

Stockbridge-Munsee Emergency Coordinator, Roger Miller, put the microphone to his walkie-talkie with a siren going off and

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Update continued on page Two: amendments, if passed, will improve the Constitution and are in the best interest of all Stockbridge-Munsee tribal members.

We respond to the BIA's comments below.

BIA COMMENT: The BIA notes that removing the Secretary of Interior and BIA from the review and approval of future constitutional amendments removes federal administrative and adjudicatory processes currently available. It also removes an independent party from the process. The Tribe will need to develop its own laws.

RESPONSE: The BIA's comment reflects a lack of understanding of the conditions here on the Reservation as everyone in the community knows them. The Stockbridge-Munsee people have been free of federal administrative processes for most of their existence. It is a step forward to become more independent and self-sufficient. While any new way of doing things can sometimes be bumpy or uncomfortable, it is a small sacrifice to make to better exercise our sovereignty as a Tribe.

The Constitution Revision Committee has drafted a proposed ordinance that governs amending the constitution.

The BIA's comment

suggests the Tribe cannot settle its own disputes without an outside independent party. As the Tribe has shown with the recent election dispute, it can resolve contentious disputes peacefully and effectively within its own institutions.

BIA COMMENT: There is concern that voters will not understand the effects of the proposed amendments.

RESPONSE: To be crystal clear for all potential voters, the proposed amendments will have three effects: 1) lower the voting age for all elections from 21 to 18; 2) remove the BIA from the process of amending the constitution; and 3) allow all tribal members to vote regardless of residency.

VOTING AGE: By way of explanation, the current constitution allows only those 21 years of age and older to vote in tribal elections. Tribal elections include things like Tribal Council elections and referendums. Because Secretarial Elections are conducted under federal law, those 18 years of age and older may vote on constitutional amendments. The proposed amendment would lower the voting age for all elections, whether for political office, referendums or on issues related to the constitution.

REMOVAL OF BIA FROM AMENDMENT PROCESS: The removal of the BIA would only affect the constitution amendment

process. The Tribe would still be a federally recognized Indian tribe and subject to BIA approval where required by federal or tribal law. For example, the Revenue Allocation Plan which governs the distribution of per capita payments would still be required to be approved by the BIA.

QUALIFIED VOTERS: The current Constitution is ambiguous as to who is a qualified voter for purposes of voting to amend the Constitution. The BIA has taken and enforced the position that only tribal members on the Reservation are eligible to vote on constitutional amendments. We do not believe this is correct nor is it consistent with the spirit of our Tribe. All tribal members are affected by the Constitution. All tribal members vote in elections for the officers and Tribal Council members. Those positions are constitutionally established. All tribal members should be able to vote on tribal council members AND constitutional amendments.

BIA COMMENT: The BIA considers the twenty percent requirement for participation as a "low" number.

RESPONSE: This issue was discussed and anticipated by the committee. The BIA's comment overlooks the fact that if the amendment goes through and all tribal members, regardless of residency, are allowed to vote, the

twenty percent threshold will be actually a higher number because the total number of eligible voters (all tribal members) will be much greater than if voting was limited to thirty percent of on-reservation voters only. The overall number of tribal members to participate in an amendment election will actually be greater than it is now, under current law.

BIA COMMENT: Consider establishing an independent entity to review proposed amendments, hold public meetings and comment on their effect.

RESPONSE: This is a worthwhile suggestion and one that the Tribal Council should consider if the amendments are enacted.

CONCLUSION: The BIA's technical comments, while well-intentioned, are made by people who don't live on the Reservation and are not governed by the Stockbridge-Munsee Constitution.

The Committee has spent many hours on these amendments discussing, thinking and reflecting on the best way to put into practice the will of the people. We believe that these amendments reflect the will of the people and will improve our Constitution. We encourage you to review the amendments and to vote in support.

Utility Department Training

All three of the Utility Department employees have completed the required training in order to complete the yearly continuing education credits to maintain their operator's certifications.

In March, Bernard Rudesill attended the Rural Water Technical Conference where he sat in on several drinking and wastewater symposiums. He was able to view and discuss a large assortment of products designed specifically for the water and waste water industry. We now have a number of resources we can use if or when we need them in the future.

In April, Dudley Welch attended a two day session at the Wisconsin Rural Water Headquarters in Plover. While there, Dudley Learned how to optimize the drinking water system and the importance of the placement and maintenance of the drinking water meters that are installed in the home. We have already started to implement some of the training.

At the end of April, Cory Wallschlaeger, Supervisor, went to Austin, Texas to attend the Annual Ovivo Operators Workshop. Even though many areas of information were presented, the important one to our tribe was how to optimize the energy consumption of the wastewater plant in order to lower operating costs.

Stockbridge-Munsee Constitution Committee Meeting April 2, 2013

Meeting called to order at 5:00 p.m. with a moment of silence to help us make fair and honest decisions.

1. Approve Minutes: Motion by Eleanor to approve minutes from the April 10th meeting, motion 2nd by Jeannie, all in favor, motion carried.

2. Letter to Community: Committee reviewed Letter "The SECRETARIAL ELECTION IS NOT A Tribal Election," with one correction to write out SM and was approved for publishing in "Mohican News."

3. New Business: Letter from BIA: Letter from BIA was shared with members. Letter stated: Midwest Regional Office is in receipt of a Petition for a Secretarial Election to revise the Constitution of the Stockbridge-Munsee Community. The Great Lakes Agency forwarded the Petition to the Midwest Regional Office where it was received March 21, 2013. Following receipt of the Petition, the Great Lakes Agency Superintendant posted a "Statement of the Matter" and no challenges have been received. Article VIII of the Stockbridge-Munsee Constitution, requires that petitions to amend the constitution must be signed by not less than one-third of the eligible voters and that the eligible voters are the adult members 18 years of age and older residing on the reservation.

She spoke about sleep apnea. Lapp indicated sleep apnea is when you are asleep and you stop breathing and wake gasping for air. She explained it can cause complications and, due to the stress it causes on the heart, can make individuals two-thirds higher risk for heart attack or stroke. Lapp explained that a CPAP (continuous positive airway pressure) machine is prescribed after one has gone through a sleep study to diagnose sleep apnea. She explained that

Enrollment Office has provided information regarding membership and residence and indicated that there are 432 eligible voters. The Petition contains 201 signatures. In reviewing the petition, there were 13 signatures that were not counted because of the reservation residence requirement. Additionally, there were 14 duplicate signatures that were not counted. Further, there are 2 signatures that will not be counted because valid current addresses were not included. Finally, the Petition included the signature of an individual who is not enrolled and that signature will not be counted. This means that there are a total of 171 signatures on the Petition, which is more than the 143 signatures needed, one third of the number of eligible voters residing on the reservation needed for the petition to be acted upon by the Secretary of the Interior.

For all of the foregoing reasons the "Petition" is considered valid and will be acted upon. Pursuant to 24 CFR & 82.10(b) this decision is final for the Department of the Interior.

4. Secretarial Election Process: Information was shared with Committee on Secretarial Process which included a Timeline. Committee reviewed information and would like to see information put out on the various Stockbridge-Munsee websites with highlighted arrow on Timeline as to where we are at right now as of April 24, 2013.

5. NEXT MEETING DATE: Next meeting scheduled for May 15, 2013 at Tribal office at 5:00. Committee will continue to work on "An Ordinance Governing Amendments to the Stockbridge-Munsee Constitution."

A report of the findings is returned to the Tribe to be used in our Title VI application; you do not have to put your name on the survey and your answers are kept confidential. We are required to collect 123 surveys and an incentive gift (donated by the Stockbridge-Munsee Tribal Council) will be given to all who participate. NOTICE TO DESCENDANTS

Health Service Funding has nearly been exhausted for the 2013 Fiscal year.

As we announced in the past, Contract Health Service funds, which are federal funds used to pay for medical services that cannot be provided at the Stockbridge-Munsee Health & Wellness Center, are limited. CHS funds usually deplete within the first few months of each fiscal year.

Enrolled and first generation descendants of the Stockbridge-Munsee Tribe are normally eligible for funds and once the CHS funds are depleted medical expenses are covered using Tribal Funds.

According to Stockbridge-Munsee Health and Wellness Center Director, Contract Health Services has two pots of money, one coming from IHS (Indian Health Service) and the other is funded by the Tribe's money called TFRS (Tribeally Funded Referral Services). He explained that when the IHS funds are exhausted [which is always underfunded], Contract Health switches to TFRS. "At that time,

second line descendants by policy are dropped from the services. This year, because of more claims and catastrophic incidents, the fund was exhausted quickly, and with some recent budget modifications, the funding level for rest of the year has been restored to its usual level," Mian explained.

Mian further added that all non-enrolled members are on now on "Medical Priority Level One" which is determined by Health Center providers. Per the Stockbridge-Munsee Contract Health Services Medical Priority Guidelines, Priority One means Emergency – threat to life, limb, senses (diagnosis and treatment of injuries or conditions that, if left untreated, result in uncertain/potentially grave outcome. "Services to enrolled members would be covered as usual and, in order for more cautious management of funds, internal cost measures would be applied," Mian said.

Lightning Safety Awareness

“When Thunder Roars...Go Indoors!”

(MADISON) – Every year, lightning kills more than 50 Americans and injures hundreds of others leaving them with lifelong pain and in some cases permanent neurological disabilities. Here in Wisconsin,

25 people have been killed and 208 injured as a result of lightning since 1982.

You can protect yourself and your family by knowing these simple lightning safety facts and tips:

- If you hear thunder, you are in danger. Don't be fooled by blue skies. If you hear thunder, lightning is close enough to pose an immediate threat. Don't wait, seek shelter immediately. Remember: When Thunder Roars...Go Indoors!
- A fully enclosed building with wiring and plumbing offers the best protection. Sheds, picnic shelters and covered porches DO NOT protect you from lightning.
- If a building is not available get into a hard-topped metal vehicle and close all the windows.
- Stay inside a safe building or vehicle for at least 30 minutes after you hear the last clap of thunder.
- Don't use a corded phone except in an emergency. Cordless and cell phones are safe to use.
- Keep away from electrical equipment and wiring.
- Because water pipes conduct electricity, don't take a bath or shower or use other plumbing during a storm.
- Stay away from isolated tall trees, towers or utility poles. Lightning tends to strike taller object in an area.
- Get an Emergency Weather Radio. It will broadcast the latest forecast for thunderstorms. Remember, any thunderstorm, whether it is severe or not, can produce deadly lightning.

Act fast if someone is struck by lightning:

- Lightning victims don't carry an electric charge and are safe to touch and need urgent medical attention. Cardiac arrest is the immediate cause of death. Call 911 immediately.
- Give CPR if the person is unresponsive or not breathing. Use an Automatic External Defibrillator if one is available.
- If possible, move the victim to a

safer place. Lightning can strike twice. Don't be a victim.

Lightning Facts:

- Lightning occurs in all thunderstorms; each year lightning strikes the United States 25 million times.
- Lightning often strikes the same place repeatedly, especially tall isolated objects.
- Most lightning victims are in open areas or near a tree.
- The energy from one lightning flash could light a 100-watt light bulb for more than 3 months.
- The air near a lightning strike is heated to 50,000°F—five times hotter than the surface of the sun!
- The rapid heating and cooling of the air near the lightning channel causes a shock wave which results in thunder.

Lightning Myths and Facts

Myth: Rubber tires on a car protect you from lightning by insulating you from the ground.

Fact: The metal roof and sides protect you, NOT the rubber tires. When lightning strikes a vehicle it goes through the metal frame into the ground. Don't lean on the vehicle doors during a thunderstorm.

Myth: If trapped outside and lightning is about to strike you should lie flat on the ground.

Fact: Lying flat increases your chance of being hit by a ground current. If you are caught outside in a thunderstorm keep moving toward a safe shelter.

Myth: If thunderstorms threaten while you are outside playing a game it is OK to finish before seeking shelter.

Fact: Many lightning casualties occur because people do not seek shelter soon enough. No game is worth death or lifelong injuries. Seek shelter immediately if you hear thunder. Adults are responsible for the safety of children.

Be Prepared
Some of the dangers associated with tornadoes and severe weather include a loss of power, telephone service and a shortage of supplies.

To help protect your family, now is the time to put together a home emergency supply kit.

Here are some items to include:

- * Flashlights and extra batteries
- * Battery-powered NOAA weather radio and a commercial radio
- * Non-perishable food that requires no cooking
- * Bottled water
- * First-aid supplies
- * Extra medications and baby items
- * Moist towelettes for sanitation
- * Make sure pets have plenty of food, water and shelter

A NOAA weather radio is like having your own emergency siren in your home. Or think of it this way, it's the smoke alarm of the weather world. A weather radio is one of the best ways to protect your family when disaster strikes. Emergency radios are a 24-hour source of weather forecasts, watches, warnings and other emergency information. If there is no emergency, the radio goes into a silent stand-by mode. When there is an emergency it sets off an alarm alerting you to the danger. These radios use S.A.M.E. technology which allows you to program your radio to alarm only for hazardous conditions that affect your county.

Make sure the unit has a back-up battery so you can continue to get warnings even if the power goes out. Also, consider a portable emergency radio especially if you do a lot of outdoor activities or road trips. You can purchase emergency radios for \$30 at most electronic stores, hardware stores and even neighborhood drug stores.

"Listen, Act and Live" is an initiative by Wisconsin Emergency Management, county and tribal emergency management offices.

When you hear a tornado warning is issued seek the best shelter you can find immediately.

Here are some ways protect yourself, your friend and your family from tornado danger.

Get Low, Get Inside—Go to the basement and get under a sturdy table or the stairs. Specifically constructed "safe rooms" within buildings offer the best protection. If a basement is not available, move to a small interior room or hallway on the lowest floor. Get

under a table or cover yourself with whatever is at hand. Put as many walls as possible between you and the storm. Stay away from windows.

If caught outside— Seek shelter in a sturdy building. If you can't quickly get to a shelter, either stay in your car with the seatbelt on or exit the vehicle and get lower than the roadway covering your head with your hands.

If in a mobile home— Get out! Seek shelter in a designated storm shelter or the lowest floor of a sturdy building nearby.

At Work or School— Conduct tornado drills so everyone knows where to go, what to do, and be accounted for. Go to an interior hallway or room with no windows. Interior bathrooms and closets are also good shelter areas. Crouch low, head down, and protect the back of your head with your arms. Stay away from large open rooms like gyms and auditoriums.

Preparedness Quiz

Does your family have an emergency plan?

Every family needs a plan in case of an emergency. Before an emergency happens, sit down together and decide how you will get in contact with each other, where you will go and what you will do in an emergency. You may also want to ask about emergency plans at places where your family spends time, such as a school or workplace. If no plans exist, consider volunteering to help create one.

What should your plan include about being separated from your family during a disaster?

Determine a neighborhood meeting place and a regional meeting place in case you cannot return home. Identify an out-of-town emergency contact. It may be easier to make a long-distance call than to call across town, so an out-of-town contact can help communicate among separated family members. If the voice service on your cell phone is down, try text messaging.

What specific items should you consider having in an emergency kit?


Prescription medications, infant formula and diapers, pet food and other pet supplies, important family documents such as copies of insurance policies and bank records and games or other activities for children.

Top 3 Tornado Safety Myths

* Seek shelter under highway overpass: No, take shelter in sturdy reinforced building if possible.

* Go to SW corner of basement: No, go to basement and get under a table or staircase. Corner doesn't matter.

* Open windows before tornado hits: No, get away from windows ASAP.

2. The limited waiver of the Tribe's sovereign immunity contained in

this Resolution shall be effective only after the parties' officially designated representatives have executed the agreements and shall only be for the term of the agreements.

3. Nothing contained in this Resolution shall be deemed consent to levy of any judgment, lien, or attachment upon any property or interest in property of the Stockbridge-Munsee Community.
4. The limited waiver of sovereign immunity granted and approved through this Resolution does not waive the sovereign immunity of any official, employee, member or agent of the Tribe.
5. Any dispute resolution action against the Tribe, as consented to through this limited waiver of sovereign immunity, shall be brought in the form, venue and under the laws identified in Section 10 of the Miscellaneous section of the agreement;

And I understand that would be the State of Wisconsin. Seconded by Shannon Holsey.

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
