Five Summer Interns were recently hired to work for the Stockbridge-Munsee Environmental Department; Kathy Arnold, Nate Bowman, Thomas Kazik, II, Cody Montez, and Leander Moon.

According to Stockbridge Munsee Community Ecology Department Manager, Randall Wollenhaup, the department is using funds obtained through a Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (WDNR) Grant to provide tribal youth with an opportunity to work on projects related to the conservation of natural resources. He says the youth have been assisting the Ecology, Environmental, and Forestry Departments with several projects and will continue to work with Stockbridge-Munsee Community staff into the month of August. "Participants are gaining hands-on natural resource management experience through activities such as: wildlife surveys, water sampling, timber sale activities, wetland delineations, stream

restoration activities, fish surveys, environmental education activities, invasive species management, and habitat restoration activities," Wollenhaup said. He indicated that in addition to the individual projects, the program is designed to provide tribal youth with a better understanding of the day-to-day activities associated with the following natural resource management positions: fish biologist, wildlife biologist, forester, forester technician, hydrologist, wetland technician, environmental technician, and invasive species technician. "If you have any questions or would like to learn more about the program feel free to contact the Environmental Department at (715) 793- 4044," Wollenhaup concluded.

Waters That Are Never Still," a literary journal of the Mohican People edited by Mark Shaw.



**Food Handler Training Opportunities**

Is your Food Handler Card expiring? In order to meet the Stockbridge Munsee Community Tribal Food Code requirements for temporary food handlers, food handler's training must be completed and/or renewed every 2 years. New food handlers and those food handlers that are due to renew their training have a couple options for keeping their card current. You must be at least 15 years old to become a food handler.

The IHS Environmental Health Specialist will be here to offer in-person training on Wednesday, August 5<sup>th</sup> at 1:00 pm, and again on Friday, August 7<sup>th</sup> at 10:00 am. The class will take about 2 hours. After completing the training, you will be issued a Food Handler's Card. The training is free of charge.

You also have the option for online food handler's training at <http://www.ihs.gov/foodhandler>. The course is free of charge. After successfully completing the online training you will need to print out a certificate of completion and send a copy to the Community Health Outreach department located at the Stockbridge Munsee Health & Wellness Center at W12802 County Hwy A, Bowler, WI. If you have questions, contact Margie Pieper (715-893-5006) or Julie Burr (715-793-5013). Training must be renewed every 2 years.



**WPT continued from page One:** recorded his answers. I am writing this article using notes that the students wrote, and I think they did a fantastic job! I am very proud of them.

Miller was asked about his culture, his family, and his friends. He said that he was Mohican. He talked about friendship and what a good friend is like. He said a good friend is someone you can count on, gives good advice, even when you're wrong. He compared a trusted friend to a hybrid car. They are there when you need them he said. He said we should be the best that we can be. He said trust is important for everyone. He is proud of his children and grandchildren, and he talked about that too.

Greg was asked to tell us about a time when he made a friend. He said when he was little, there was a boy down the road that was the same age. He was a dear friend. He said he chose a different path in life. He was a trusted friend of Mr. Miller's. He was always loyal. His name was Dave. Mr. Miller said that friends are the best thing that you can have. He said they liked to hunt squirrels and coons. His mom cooked the coons. They killed and ate animals. They didn't kill them just to kill them.

Miller went to Bowler School, and after that, he went to Michigan Tech for forestry, then at West Point. He said school was kind of hard. He said what he thought were big problems really weren't. He said our attitude makes us successful, and there are a lot of choices we have to make. He said any career can be ours. He said his favorite subject was World History. He said he did well in that subject and his teachers made it fun. He was interested in a lot of things.

Greg was asked about his favorite teacher. His favorite teacher was Mrs. Jones. She challenged him. She even followed the careers of her students. She even sent birthday cards to them until she passed away. She was very dedicated. He said there were bullies when he was in school, but that kids hung around together and didn't let bullying happen. He said bullying disrupts the community. He said we can help by making it lonely for the bully. He said eventually, bullies were brought back into the group.

It was interesting listening to Mr. Miller talk about different jobs he has had. He scaled logs for a while. He worked for the U.S. Forest Service and was in different parts of the country. He fought forest fires out west. He worked for the Department of the Interior for five or six years. He was a postmaster

in Bowler, and is retired now. He worked for the government for 37 years and retired when he was 55. He enjoyed what he did, and said we should too.

Greg was asked what he liked to do for fun when he was younger, and what he likes to do for fun now. He said that he likes fishing and would be going on a trip to Canada soon. He likes to run rabbits with his grandkids, and likes snowshoe rabbits in Canada too. He enjoys spending time with his family, friends, and grandchildren. He likes to cook, and sometimes use a Dutch oven when he is outdoors. He said that when he was a kid never to tell your mom that you are bored. She will find something for you to do. He said when he was younger, he liked to play in the woods and play softball. He said he liked learning things from his dad, who taught him about plants and medicines.

Miller told us a favorite story of his. He said one time he was picking berries with his mom. He said they had to dress up special for this activity. He wore three shirts and pants! They would take their pails to the store and get treats. They got donuts and milk. While they were in the store, they were wearing their berry-picking clothes and a girl asked if the circus was in town.

He also talked about different places he has been. He said he didn't really enjoy moving. He lives on the reservation now, and has never lived in the city. His favorite place is where he lives now. He has been to Houghton, Michigan and Antigo, Wisconsin. He had an opportunity to travel to Romania. He said there are "facts we don't know about." He said some kids had to stay there at the school all the time, and some went home. He also talked about Act 31 and trust. He said Act 31 brings us all together. He said Act 31 lets people in school know about the history and culture of Native People in Wisconsin.

Greg was asked if there was something about him that might surprise some people. He said that even though it is hard to talk in front of people, he once taught at a college in Wittenberg, Germany. He also talked about things that concern him. He is concerned about Mother Earth. He said we need to pay attention when she is tired and weary. We can all make a little difference. He explained that it is important to think about kids and seven generations. He said we are here to support the animals, and while we can't do everything, we can do something to help Mother Earth.

Miller gave the students some

advice. He told them to stay in school and do the best they can. He said our parents are important in life. They teach us about life. He said that some of the best advice we get is an arm's length away, and we should talk to those around us. He was asked about what he would want people to know or remember about him. He said that education is very

important in all things we do in life. He said there are different kinds of education, the kind we get in school, and the kind we get from our parents.

I really enjoyed Mr. Miller's visit, and I learned a lot, and so did my students.

Council Member, Joe Miller

I was honored to have Joe Miller visit my third grade social studies class this year. Students interviewed Joe Miller, and recorded his answers. I am writing this article using the notes that students wrote, and they did an awesome job!

The students asked Joe Miller a range of questions about his culture and history, and his family. He said he is a member of the Stockbridge-Munsee Band of Mohican Indians. When asked about his clan, Joe talked about four clans, the Turkey, Wolf, Bear, and Turtle clans. He said he likes to think that he is a little bit from each. He told the students that he has lived by the same house for 57 years, his whole life. His grandfather built the house in the 1930's. He also talked about the writing of his ancestors, and said it was like art.

Joe Miller spoke to the class about school, and what it was like for him. He graduated from Bowler High School. He is currently on the school board at Bowler. Joe said that school was easy and fun. He said school was only hard if people made it hard. He said he rode the bus to and from school. Joe spoke about kids and other young people having an important opportunity to help others. When they get older, they can help the younger people. He said this was like the circle of life. We are taken care of when we are younger, and when we are older,

we are responsible for taking care of others. He said "Help younger people be older people."

Joe's favorite subjects in school were Geography, Civics, and current events. He liked to study the globe and know about other places. He liked Civics and current events, and explained that when he was a kid, there were only three T.V. stations and T.V.'s were black and white only. He had time to watch T.V. after supper, and liked to watch the news with his grandma.

Joe Miller was asked about his favorite teacher and why he or she was his favorite. He said he had many favorites, and his least favorite teachers were the ones he learned the most from. He said good teachers could communicate with different students at different levels. He said students should always respect teachers, whether they like them or not. Joe said he was a "handful" when he was in school. He said students should do what teachers ask "without hesitation." He said by doing this, students will be less likely to be TOLD what to do.

Joe offered some advice for kids in school. He said kids should learn what they can, and be will to do extra, more than what is expected. He said your reputation in school is the most important thing you can have; it will follow you throughout your life.

Joe Miller said he had a lot of

**WPT continued from page Five:** friends when he was a kid. They rode bikes, and rode around to visit. He lived in the country and liked it there. He liked to play ball in the summer. Joe was asked about what it means to be a good friend. He said a good friend is someone who listens, and someone you can talk back and forth with, about everything. He also said a good friend tells you if you do something they don't like. Other friends are acquaintances, and good friends accept you for who you are.

Joe was asked if there was something about him that might surprise some people. He said he likes hunting and fishing, but that really wasn't a surprise. He said the less surprises there are, the better it is; it means a better reputation. He said don't be like a wolf in sheep's clothing; he said we should represent ourselves in our truest form.

Joe Miller talked to the students about jobs he has had. He said he worked while he was in high school, in summer programs. He worked in the woods after high school. He was in logging. In 1980, he was a conservation officer and game warden. In 1990, he became a sheriff's deputy. In the the 2000's he became a game warden. He said for 30 years he carried a gun and a badge, and that that was a big responsibility. He said he was protecting animals, and that was his job. For the last seven years, he has been a Tribal Council member.

Joe was asked about things that concern him. He responded and said young people and social media communication, and the impact that has on people. He

said interactions on Facebook are disheartening, and that more direct communication with each other is better. He said once things are out on the internet, you can't take them back.

Joe Miller was asked to tell a story, and he told the class a story about 9-11-2001, when the Twin Towers fell. He went to New York City with some council members. They wanted to go to the observatory on top of the World Trade Center. They weren't able to do that at that time, and went on a boat ride by the Statue of Liberty instead. He said the next time they were in New York, "They went to see the "hole in the ground." They never got to go to the observatory. This was hard for Joe to talk about, but it was very important for students to hear, and I appreciate it very much. As he told students this story, he said we should not be afraid to let our emotions out. "It is a sign of strength."

Joe ended his talk by speaking about things he is thankful for, and how he would like to be remembered. He said he is thankful for his family first. He said those relationships are important. "With a family there is always a place to go, and they are always here." Joe said he would want people to remember his big smile. He said things are better when you smile. He also said "Don't be afraid to give hugs." He said to be honest and open with our feelings. Never be afraid to express your feelings.

This was a truly wonderful and interesting experience for my students and myself. Thank you Joe!



Jeremy Mohawk Visits Bowler School

Jeremy Mohawk came and talked to our fourth grade Social Studies class. His favorite subjects in school were Math, History, and Gym. My favorite subjects are the same. These are my favorite subjects too. He went to school at Gresham. He talked about Act

31, which is something sort of new to teachers. Act 31 is a law that requires Native American culture and history to be taught in schools to help all people to understand about their culture. It is about the 11 federally recognized tribes in Wisconsin, and he said the Stockbridge-Munsee Mohican People are one of those tribes. As a result of Act 31, Gresham and Bowler have pow wows, and they

didn't always have that. I think this is important. He was asked about his favorite teacher, and he said Mrs. Mueller was his favorite teacher. She has taught his children Ashwuut, Weengeetah, and Jeremy.

Mohawk was asked about what a good friend is. He said a good friend is someone you can trust, and even if you argue with them, you can come back again as friends. I agree.

He talked about things he liked to do for fun when he was a kid. When he was a kid, he liked to go outside. He said his grandma would make breakfast, and then he went to the woods. He liked to fish on the lake and ride bikes. He said some parents have to tell their kids to go outside, but when he was a kid, he had to be called IN. I like some of the same things.

Jeremy was asked about different jobs he has had. He has washed dishes in a restaurant when he was younger. He first did summer work at a place called the Whistle Stop. After he graduated high school, he worked at a quarry. He has worked with my friend Odin's dad making granite counter tops. He was worked at wood mills. He made crates for Ocean Spray. He has worked at a veneer and plywood factory. He has also worked as a security guard in a casino. He worked again at the casino in security here at Bowler. He has worked in daycare too. He has worked in maintenance and housekeeping at the Health Center. He is now on the Tribal

Council, and that is his favorite because he gets to help people.

He is an enrolled Stockbridge-Munsee Mohican, but he has other Native blood too. He said his Mohican family came out here from New York in 1839. Mr. Mohawk's clan is the Caribou Clan (hooved clan). This clan carries the language. Mr. Mohawk taught us some words in the Language. He even told us a story about using big medicine to help people. He was asked why he is proud to be Native. He said he was proud because it was good to be a part of people who have been on Turtle Island. He said he is proud to be Irish and German too. He said all these things make him who he is.

Mohawk was asked about things he is proud of. He said he is proud to see Native history being taught in the schools. He is proud to see language ceremonies coming back. He said he is proud that roads are paved on the Rez. He said we should honor ourselves, and not be hurtful to each other. He said we are all unique in our own way. He said it is important to work hard and smart. He talked about seven generations, and how every generation is a seventh generation. He said this means we should be thinking about our future.

Jeremy Mohawk is my dad; I felt pretty good when my dad came in. He said some things that I didn't even know, like how one of his favorite subjects was history. It was cool to have my dad come and talk to my class.

with her family.

One day an elder came in and talked about her life. Her name was JoAnn Schedler. She came to my class and talked to us. She told us that she was Wolf and Turtle Clan on her Gardner side. JoAnn is part of two nations, Mohican and Stockbridge-Munsee. She is a veteran too. She was born in Bowler. There were no jobs in Bowler so she went to Milwaukee

One of the students in my class asked her about people in her family. She said John Konkapot was chief who was also her ancestor. I think that is pretty interesting.

Another kid in my class asked her about different jobs she has had. First, she started out as a waitress; then she was a babysitter, a

## Polar Bears at Bowler School!?!?




