October 18, Stockbridge-Munsee Community held its annual swearing-in for newly elected Tribal Council Members. What made the event unique this year was because first, President Shannon Holsey swore in the new Chief Judge Travis Miller, and then Chief Judge Miller swore in the elected Tribal Council Members. The newly elected Tribal Council Members are Vice President Matt Putnam, Tribal Council Member Marv "Buttons" Malone, Tribal Council Member Jeremy Mohawk, Tribal Council

2018 the Member Sterling Schreiber, and Tribal Council Member Craig Kroening Jr. Each of the Tribal Council Members was able to address the community who attended the swear in with a brief speech. Following their speeches were congratulations and handshakes from the community members. "Being a Tribal Council Member is a challenging role, and an important role as we lead our nation and prepare for the next generation," President Shannon Holsey stated in an email she sent out on October 18, 2018.

#### The Investiture ceremony was recently held at the Menominee

Nation Five Clans Banquet Hall in Keshena WI. Dr. Trebian was gifted a beaded medallion from

ceremonially invested President.

Dr. Trebian is CMN's (College Virginia Nuske Chairperson of of Menominee Nation) first the board of trustees, and he wore it proudly around his neck throughout the remainder of the ceremony. The new President will be stepping in for Verna Fowler who retired in 2016.

"I'm excited to return home after completing my educational goals

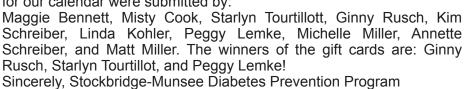

### Behind the bog...

In its natural habitat, the cranberry plant grows vigorously in acidic sandy bogs, all across the temperate and cooler parts of Northern states in the United States. Cranberry season generally lasts from October until December. The fruit is small, round, red color berry. The berries are indeed containing numerous health benefiting chemical substances that may offer protection from tooth cavities, urinary tract infection, and inflammatory diseases.

Delicious, tart cranberries hold significantly high amounts of phenolic flavonoid phytochemicals. Scientific studies have shown that consumption of berries have potential health benefits against cancer, aging and neurological diseases, inflammation, diabetes, and bacterial infections.

Antioxidant pigments are largely concentrated in berries that feature deep red skin. Discard any wet, mottled berries as they tend to spread the mold to rest of the stock. While fresh, as well as dry berries carry good level of antioxidants, bottled cranberry drinks and cranberry cocktails with added sugars may actually devoid of them. Fresh berries can be stored inside the refrigerator for several days. Sort out any discolored, soft, shriveled or sticky fruits before storing. They have a very short shelf life if kept at room temperature

## November: Diabetes Lifestyle as Prevention

November is National Diabetes Awareness Month. When we discuss awareness, prevention seems to come trotting right alongside. Afterall, if we want to be aware of the disease then we also want to prevent it for ourselves and our families.

Prevention can come in many forms, these can include regular testing for diabetes, physical activity most days of the week, and eating a mindful and well-balanced diet. So, just living an overall healthy lifestyle, something all of us should be doing daily.

What you eat is just as important as how much you eat. Following healthy portion sizes can be a great way to monitor your intake of carbohydrates, protein and fiber.

An easy way to know how much your eating is by using the plate method. Using a basic 9" plate draw an imaginary line down the middle and across the plate creating four sections.

Fill half of the plate with nonstarchy vegetables and fruit (fruit can also be on the side and two servings of vegetables can fill half the plate.

Non-starchy vegetables are lettuce, carrots, broccoli, cauliflower, etc. and starchy vegetables are potatoes, sweet potatoes, corn, peas. In one of the smaller sections put your grains or starchy vegetables such as bread, rice, pasta, potatoes, etc. This is usually 1/3 - ½ cup serving.

The last smaller section is for your protein, this can be fish, chicken, lean beef, eggs, beans, etc. About a 3 oz portion per meal is adequate. You can add a serving of dairy on the side as well, focus on low fat dairy products to avoid extra fat in your diet.

You can also apply this plate method when shopping for your food. Shopping can be a very tempting experience with all the bright ads and packaging, aisles full of treats and sweets, and feeling of hunger depending on when you are shopping. When you look at your cart remember the plate method.

Half of your food items should be fruits and non-starchy vegetables. Then a quarter can be lean

proteins and another quarter whole grains and starchy vegetables. An occasional treat is fine too, just watch that the treats are not most of the cart.

Sticking to the outside of the store can be helpful, this is where the fresh foods and lean products tend to be.

First make a loop around the outside of the store to get your fresh product, lean proteins, low fat dairy products and then move to the necessary inside aisles to fill in any last items.

There is no need to venture down every aisle, this can help avoid tempting items all together.

Support can be a big help when you are focusing on your health. Getting help form friends, family and co-workers can mean the difference between achieving and maintaining your goals and throwing them out the window.

Healthy eating is important for everyone, not just people with diabetes or trying to prevent it. Ask your family and friends for support especially when meal planning or at special occasions, the holidays are right around the corner and can be a challenging time when watching your eating habits. Teach you support circle about healthy eating and what you're doing!

While November gives us the opportunity to discuss diabetes and prevention we need to think about preventing and managing diabetes every month.

This means maintaining a healthy diet full of fiber, fruits and vegetables, lean protein, and lower carbohydrate foods. Living an overall healthy lifestyle by participating in regular physical activity, at least 150 minutes per week.

Finally, having regular visits with your health care professionals such as physicians, dietitians, and diabetes nurse, and being checked throughout the year for diabetes.

These are the areas we have control over in our lives, so working to make positive improvements in these areas can lead to successful health overall.

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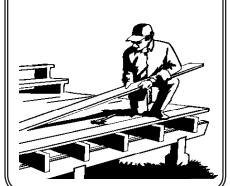

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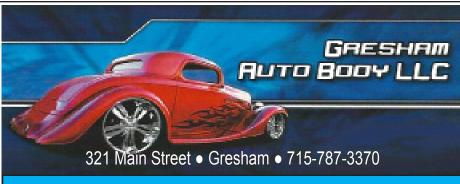
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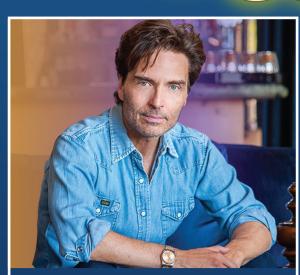
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
