
Marvin C. Denny

While our movement in Indian Country has always governed by our traditional values, it is vital in today's society that we highlight the roles that women play, not just in leadership, but in the heart of our traditional community.

In Native tradition, Women have always been considered as the sacred givers of life. The balance between males and females in decision making has always been important. Before the official opening of the Tradeshow floor, we invite you to join us for a special Keynote event Woman Warriors - Honoring on Wednesday, April 3 at 9:00 AM as the National **Indian Gaming Association honors** seven of our women elected Tribal Leaders in recognition of their commitment and leadership for their Tribal Nations and all of Indian Country.

National Indian Gaming Association Chairman Ernie Stevens, Jr., commended the outstanding Women Warriors and said, "Our women are our strength and our resilience and ensure our future. These great Women leaders have without a doubt been strong leaders for not only the tribal communities they represent but are the greatest example of leaders who have dedicated their lives to the advancement of tribal government gaming and economic diversification, serving as examples for all of Indian country."

Incorporated in 1985, National Indian Gaming Association (NIGA) is an inter-tribal association of federally recognized Indian Tribes united with the mission of protecting and preserving tribal sovereignty and the ability of Tribes to attain economic self-sufficiency through gaming and other forms of economic development. The common commitment and purpose of NIGA is to advance the lives of Indian peoples economically, socially, and politically. NIGA operates as an educational, legislative, and public policy resource for tribal policy makers as well as the public, on issues related to Indian gaming and tribal community development.

Located on Capitol Hill, NIGA is a leading voice for Indian Country, working diligently to ensure that the special status of tribes is recognized and protected when issues affecting tribal sovereignty arise. NIGA advocates on behalf of Indian tribes with Congress, the White House and federal agencies. In order to accomplish its mission, NIGA often works with Congress and the administration on all Indian Issues under the Commerce Clause.

NIGA completed an expansion of the original building in 2015. The Stanley R. Crooks Tribal Leader Conference Center and a multistory connection between the historic main house and revolutionary era carriage house structures, transformed NIGA's headquarters from primarily office space to a prime conference-meeting center for legislative activities on Capitol Hill.

Ambulatory health care organizations seeking accreditation by AAAHC undergo an extensive self-assessment and on-site survey by AAAHC expert surveyors — physicians, nurses, and administrators who are actively involved in ambulatory health care. The survey is consultative and educational, presenting best practices to help an organization improve its care and services.

"Going through the process challenged us to find better

ne: ways to serve our patients, and care it is a constant reminder that seeking our responsibility is to strive to undergo continuously improve the quality of nent and care we provide," said Miller.

The present Health Center was constructed in September of 1999, and the 30,170 square foot facility was moved into on November 16, 2000. The tribally-owned health center is open to the public. Staff at the Health Center strive to provide the highest level of healthcare possible, within available resources.

Wildland Fire Season has begun.

As we go from hibernating to thinking spring, as a homeowner/renter you are probably thinking of campfires, cleaning your yard and the warm weather. But, are we thinking about Wildfires?

Even with the snow that is left on the ground, a wildfire can still occur. The open grass areas, like above, which have dead brown grass can burn.

Checking on the Wisconsin DNR website as of March 28, 2019, there have been a total of 38 wildfires in the state to date. A number of these fires were started by a homeowner burning debris and the fire escaping. According to National Fire Prevention Association, the Wisconsin DNR and the US Fire Administration The primary cause of all wildfires is by human acts of carelessness. Other common causes of wildfires include:

Unattended campfires: They are one main reason for causing wildfires. Campers leave lit fires or other combustible materials unattended, which can ignite wildfires. It is therefore very essential that we take precautions and extinguish all lit fires and ignitable objects to avoid wildfires. We must, therefore, choose a safe location and be prepared to with ways to keep camping safe.

Burning debris: Burning our wastes and trash also causes fire when not attended carefully. Many of these fires start when people violate burn restrictions set by the state. When aggravated by winds the flames can set ablaze anything and spread into forests, farms or fields.

Smoking: When smokers discard their cigarette butts carelessly while still burning, it poses a serious risk of causing fires. Smokers have no idea the impact caused to the environment and surrounding areas due to their negligence. We can prevent fires caused by smoking if we properly discard all smoking materials in ashtrays, vehicles and put off cigarettes butts before throwing.

Vehicles: Equipment failure in vehicles is also the cause of wildfires. A running engine, car crashes, gas balloons and engine sparks can start high flames when things go wrong. Even a small engine spark can ignite wildfires if operated within or near a field or forest. Sparks caused due to faulty and outdated home appliances can result in electrical fires. Though accidental, yet, if not identified quickly, such mechanical sparks can start massive wildfires.

Fireworks: Fireworks if not handled properly may end up in flames. A single stray spark can be the cause of wildfires and can burn down hundreds of acres of land. The explosive nature of fireworks, sparklers and smoke bombs can



cause massive wildfires. It is therefore advisable to avoid fireworks where there is even a little chance of causing a fire.

Lightning: Lightning can also cause wildfires. When lightning strikes trees, rocks, power cables and many other things, it can produce a spark triggering off a fire. Lightning causes a type of wildfire called "hot lightning." They are common in dry vegetation. Since these fires occur far from human presence, they destroy more vegetation than other fires.

Arson: The malicious and deliberate act of setting fire or destroying land, house or property also causes wildfires. A person committing such crime is known as an arsonist. Sometimes people commit arson in order to receive compensation for their property.

Effects of climate change plays a part according to some experts
Below are some Tips for Landscaping Around Your

- Home
 REMOVE dead vegetation and other flammable materials, especially within the first 5 feet of the
- KEEP your lawn hydrated and maintained. If it is brown, cut it down to help reduce fire intensity.
- **PRUNE** tree limbs so the lowest branches are 6 to 10 feet above the ground to help reduce the chance of fire getting into the crowns of the trees.
- **MOVE** construction material, trash, and woodpiles at least 30 feet away from the home and other outbuildings.
- **DISPOSE** of branches, weeds, leaves, pine needles, and grass clippings that you have cut to reduce fuel for fire.

During the time a wildfire is in your area...

- Stay aware of the latest news and updates from your local media and fire department.
- Close and protect your home's openings, including attic and basement doors and vents, windows, garage doors and pet doors to prevent embers from penetrating your home.

Kori Price is the family services manager at the Mohican Family Center and her department offers services to the community. She has been in her position for six years. The department has different programs. One of the programs is for human immunodeficiency virus, also known as HIV. They provide prevention services, free condoms, and discussions what HIV and sexually transmitted diseases are, also known as a STD. Another program is for low income. There are two transitional living facilities to live in for community

members who want to come back to the community for employment or family. While staying at the facility as a requirement the tenants must seek employment and housing. Family services also host a youth education program about prevention. We teach alcohol, tobacco, and drug abuse awareness. They provide a snack, a light supper, prevention lesson, and traditional teachings. These are done once a week. "One of the biggest challenges I face is parent involvement," said Kori. A new game room upstairs is now up and running. There are two PlayStation and two Xbox game consoles,





Are you prepared for severe weather or Tornado's? Well, if not, you better hurry because the Severe Weather season is upon us. April 8th - 12th is severe weather awareness week and the state will be doing drills throughout the week. According to the National Weather Service, Wisconsin has an average of 23 tornados annually. However, last year the state of Wisconsin had 33 tornados. On August 28th, 2018 there were 19 tornados that hit Wisconsin, this is the second largest tornado outbreak in history.

Here are some safety tips for home, work, play or school.

• In home or buildings, avoid windows. Move to your basement and get under a sturdy table or the stairs. If you don't have a basement move to a small room or hall-way on the lowest floor and cover yourself with blankets, towels or pillows.

If outdoors, seek shelter in

a sturdy building. If you can't get to shelter, stay in your vehicle with the seatbelt on and place your head below the windows.

• If in a mobile home, even if tied down, they offer little protection from Tornados. You should leave the mobile home and go to a designated storm shelter or to the lowest floor level of a sturdy nearby building.

 And lastly if at school, go to the interior hall or room. Crouch low, head down, and protect the back of your head with your arms. Stay away from large windows and doors and large rooms like gyms and auditoriums.

Develop a plan for you and your family whether for home, work or the outdoors. Know the safest shelter area's in multiple locations. Make sure you have a disaster kit made up and ready for action when needed. Some of those items should include: water, snacks, unperishable food items, your emer-



gency weather radio, flashlight, extra batteries and a first-aid kit. Also make sure your electronic devices are fully charged. Have frequent drills with your family often so you are prepared in the case of a tornado.

Lastly here are some shelter area's in our community:

• Tornado shelter (located behind the family center)

Don't forget a mock tornado watch will occur on April 11th at 1 p.m. and at 1:45 p.m. there will be

a mock tornado warning. At 2 p.m. the tornado test will end. A second mock tornado warning will be issued at 6:45 p.m. and the test will end at 7 p.m.

Vaccines protect much more than just your own child. This isn't about just one child, this is about protecting everybody from these preventable diseases. Vaccinate your kids.

Measles is highly contagious.

Measles is one of the most contagious diseases in the world. It's so contagious that a measles patient can cough or sneeze, leave the room, and somebody else can be infected by walking in the room an hour or two later.

"Measles is so contagious that if one person has it, up to 90 percent of the people close to that person who are not immune will also become infected," says the website for the federal Centers for Disease Control.

Before the measles vaccine was introduced in 1963, an estimated 3 to 4 million people got measles each year in the United States. Each year, about 400 to 500 people died from measles and 48,000 were hospitalized in the pre-vaccine era, the CDC says.

The acute stage of the disease lasts about five to six days.

Measles typically begins with a mild to moderate fever, often accompanied by a persistent cough, runny nose, inflamed eyes and sore throat. This stage last two to three days.

The next stage is a rash consisting of small red dots and bumps, starting with the face and spreading down the arms and trunk. The fever may spike as high as 105.8 degrees. The rash recedes gradually, fading first from the face and last from the thighs and feet.

Measles can result in serious complications.

Measles can be serious in all age groups, especially adults and in children under 5, the CDC says. Among the complications, according to the CDC website:

- Ear infections occur in about one out of every 10 children with measles and can result in permanent hearing loss.
- As many as one out of every 20 children with measles gets pneumonia, the most common cause of death from measles in young children.
- About one child out of every 1,000 who get measles will develop encephalitis, or swelling of the brain, that can lead to convulsions and can leave the child deaf or with intellectual disability.
- For every 1,000 children who get measles, one or two will die from it.
- Measles may cause pregnant woman to give birth prematurely, cause birth defects or have a low-birth-weight baby.

People with measles can spread the disease before they feel sick. Measles symptoms generally appear about seven to 14 days after a person is infected, although it may take as long as 21 days. The person is contagious for about eight days, starting four days before the rash first appears and ending four days after the rash has broken out.

Measles vaccine is between 97 and 93 percent effective.

The MMR vaccine -- which covers measles, mumps and rubella -- is about 97 percent effective for who have had two doses and 93 percent effective for those who have had one dose.

How Abusive Partners Use Sexual Assault as a Form of Control

Sexual violence can be difficult to talk about. Some people feel uncomfortable when the subject comes up, which - intentionally or not - sends a message to survivors of sexual abuse and sexual assault that they won't be believed if they come forward.

Sexual assault is any type of sexual activity or contact that you do not consent to. In an abusive relationship, some partners might sexually assault their partner or force them into unwanted sexual activity as a means of control. This type of violence can be one of the most traumatic forms of relationship abuse.

Across the nation, more than half of Native American women (56 percent) and about one-third of Native men (28 percent) have experienced sexual violence in their lifetime, according to a recent report. The report also found that Native women - our mothers, grandmothers, daughters and sisters - face nearly two times the risk of sexual violence when compared to non-Hispanic white women.

Sexual abuse in a relationship

There is a strong connection between colonialism and sexual violence. As Native people, we know any form of violence such as sexual assault and sexual abuse is unnatural and goes against our traditional ways. Sexual violence was introduced into our communities through colonization, as Native women were often violently targeted, humiliated, degraded and terrorized as a way to undermine the very foundation of Native communities.

As a form of domestic violence, sexual abuse is used to assert power and control in relationship. The behaviors can range from:

- Calling you degrading sexual names
- Fondling, grabbing or pinching the sexual parts of your body
- Constantly pressuring you to have sex when you don't want to have sex
- Becoming angry or violent when refused sex
- Demanding or normalizing demands for sex by saying things like, "I need it, I'm a man"
- Drugging or restricting you to where you are unable to consent to sexual activity
- Forcing you to have sex or engage in unwanted sexual activity (ex. rape, anal rape, forced masturbation or forced oral sex)
- Using weapons or other objects to hurt the sexual parts of your

body

- Records or photographs you in a sexual way without your consent
- Intentionally tries to pass on a sexually transmitted disease to
- Threatening to hurt you or your children if you do not have sex
- Demanding you to dress is a sexual way
- Forcing you to watch pornogra-

effects Lasting of sexual violence

Sexual assault can affect your spirit in many ways, including feelings of depression, fear or anxiety, difficulty sleeping, and posttraumatic stress disorder (PTSD). Some survivors may experience flashbacks of the attack or may disassociate from what happened entirely to cope with the trauma. When there is ongoing sexual abuse in a relationship, trauma and other negative impacts can worsen.

Some survivors may become very sensitive to touch or struggle with intimacy in their relationships. It's important to recognize not all survivors will react the same way and often report a range of feelings about the experience.

After a sexual attack, you may feel alone, ashamed or believe you did something to provoke the attack or that you somehow 'deserved it.' You may also feel that your community is not a safe place anymore. However, you are never to blame for rape, sexual assault or any form of abuse that happens to you.

Finding hope and healing

Recovering from sexual assault or sexual abuse is a process and one in which you decide every step of the way. There is no timeline for healing; it is entirely up to you.

It is important to know that in the aftermath of sexual assault or abuse, you do not have to face your healing journey alone. When you are ready, there are people available to help you if you have been sexually assaulted or are being sexually abused by a current or former intimate partner.

Advocates StrongHearts at Native Helpline (1-844-762-8483, available daily from 7 a.m. to. 10 p.m. CT) can offer emotional support and a connection to culturally-appropriate resources and legal options where available. It is always anonymous and confidential when you call. You can also find sexual assault service providers here.

While your healing journey may be painful, remember you were born with the strength and courage of your ancestors to survive. We believe you. We are here for you every step of the way.






