Retired Major JoAnne Schedler, US Army Veteran and member of the Mohican Veterans, gave a presentation of the history of the Stockbridge-Munsee Mohican Veterans through the years that they served. Mohican Veterans have served in every war and conflict from the beginning of the European invasion starting with the Civil War.

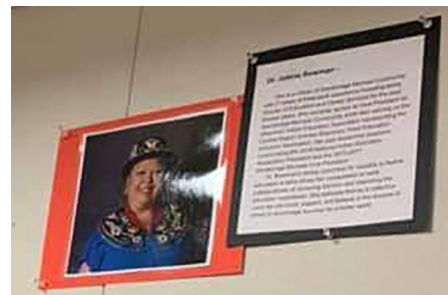
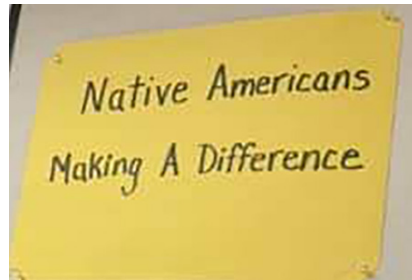
Schedler was a contributing writer of the book, "American Indians and the Civil War", with the cover photo contributed by Donna Hogerhuis in honor of esteemed Tribal Elder Thelma Davids-Putnam. It depicts Jonas Davids, Union Army, Wisconsin 2<sup>nd</sup> Cavalry Co. A.

This sparked the interest in Schedler to continue her research of Stockbridge-Munsee Mohican Veterans during the Civil War. She is continuing her research and is currently working on a book of this chapter of Mohican history. Much of her research stems from family's personal letters, pictures and personal handed down stories of their history from the soldiers during this time of war. Indians weren't even recognized as U.S. citizens, yet they heeded the call to war.

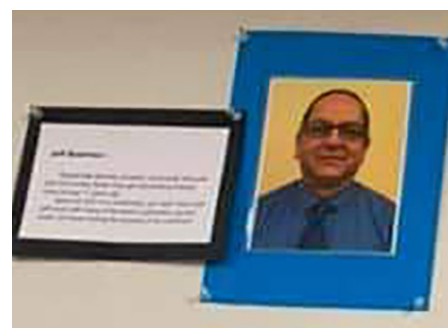
Many of the treaties signed in the 1800's called for "loyalty oaths" that required tribes to come to the aid of the United States, and the Tribes stayed true to their treaties, even though the U.S. may not

**Museum Staff creating "Wall of Sachems" in Tribal Offices**

A long-term project is underway to create a historical timeline of the Leaders of the Stockbridge-Munsee Band of Mohicans, from 1771 through today. "There are to date, a total of 43 Tribal Leaders through the years that we kept track of our formal leadership," said Heather Bruegl, Cultural Affairs Director of the Arvid E. Miller Memorial Library Museum. This exhibit is slated to be a permanent fixture of our walls

in the Headquarters meeting space, Tribal Courthouse and offices that also house our Tribal Council Leaders. There is a goal to have each leader represented by a drawing, painting or photo that represents them. Going back to 1771 predates photography and some of our past leadership haven't had photos available. A brief biography of each person will also be placed adjacent to each Tribal Leader to assist with educating the publics of their

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Stockbridge-Munsee Fire and Rescue have some safety tips for the upcoming winter season:



## TIPS

Tip number 1:

Do not use the dryer without a lint filter. Clean the lint filter before and after each cycle.

Do not forget to clean the back of the dryer where lint can build up.

Check the venting system behind the dryer to make sure that it is not damaged, crushed or restricted.

Make sure that the outdoor vent covering opens when the dryer is operating.



Tip number 2:

Check that you're using the correct wattage in all your fixtures and appliances

Watch out for overloaded outlets to protect your home

Replace or repair damaged electrical cords to keep your home safe.

Keep your used and unused cords tidy and secure to prevent damage

Tip number 3:

Use space heaters that shut off when tipped over.

Keep a distance of 3 feet away from combustibles.

Make sure they are shut off when not home or while sleeping.

Plug heaters directly into outlets and never use extension cords.



Tip number 4:

Chimney fires are often the result of improper care and maintenance.

Have Your Chimney and Fireplace Cleaned and Inspected Annually

Build Small Fires

Use Seasoned Wood

Use a Chimney Liner

number 5:

Plug all kitchen appliances, including microwaves, toasters and coffee makers, directly into a wall outlet.

Use the right outlet for the right appliance.

Unplug small appliances when not in use.

Keep your stove and oven clean.

Check and clean stove hoods and filters regularly

Stay in the kitchen when cooking.

Keep potholders and towels away from the stove



Final tip:

Make sure your home has Both a carbon Monoxide and a smoke alarm

Remember to Tested them once a month



Have a family escape plan in place and practice it with your family.

## Food Distribution, More Than A Block of Cheese

What exactly is housed within the Food Distribution building? Program Supervisor, Jill Duffek, spent some time sharing the growth that has occurred in the last few years of the Food Distribution building. It was an amazing sight to see the inside of the building commonly referred to as the "Commod Shop". The waiting area is very inviting and relaxing while coming in to see the services offered.

The main focus of this site is still Food Distribution in addition to the numerous other events that are hosted within the building.

Housed within the reception area itself, there is a small book exchange library that many community members utilize. They can pick out books to take and can leave books they are finished with and want to share. This is a popular spot for many of our community elderly to come in.

The building holds an excellent teaching kitchen that is utilized by Casey Rosenberg, who is the Nutritionist housed within our own Health & Wellness Center. Once a month Casey holds a "make and take" food items as a part of our Diabetes grant within her program. Duffek herself then holds a class following this towards the middle or end of the month to continue the learning aspect after normal business hours.

"Make and Take is an educational cooking class where participants learn how to make healthy, diabetes-friendly meals which they can take home and bake and enjoy. We have held the

program since May of 2016 and can accommodate 15 participants each month. The class is free for any community members to participate in and we make a variety of recipes. We have made recipes with various proteins including fish, shrimp, beef, chicken, pork, etc. Vegetarian dishes, healthy desserts, breakfast ideas, and more", said Rosenberg. Upcoming dates: November 12<sup>th</sup>, December 10<sup>th</sup>, January 14<sup>th</sup>, and February 11<sup>th</sup>.

There was a grant back in 2018 that infused funds into the Dieticians program to do some workshops focusing on Canning, dehydrating and utilizing foods that are readily available within our own communities.

This grant allowed for the purchase of kettles, canning jars and dehydrating supplies to be able to provide training within the teaching kitchen. Although the grant ended, staff within our Tribe still provide monthly teachings onsite within the kitchen itself.

The Kitchen itself is very large and accommodating for the teaching classes, as well as hosting site for fundraisers in the past. There have been events held onsite as well as one that just came into utilize the kitchen space to make a lot of the food items for their event. Community members have the option to call or e-mail ahead to make arrangements with Jill Duffek to utilize the kitchen for fundraising events. Just make sure you give ample time to ensure she has scheduling availability and can arrange to be onsite.

**Sachems cont from page One:** leadership time and contributions to the Stockbridge-Munsee Band of Mohicans throughout history. According to, "A Nation of Statesmen", available at the Stockbridge-Munsee Historical Library-Museum, there have been more than Sixty separate reports to the House and Senate on Stockbridge-Munsee Mohican affairs in New York and Wisconsin. There have been Five ratified treaties between the Senate and Stockbridge-Munsee Mohicans between 1794 and 1856. There were Four other treaties that weren't ratified, but were negotiated and signed by all, and the Senate refused ratification. There were Ten congressional Acts between 1843 and 1972 between related to Stockbridge-Munsee Mohican business. The Tribe also regularly appeared as plaintiffs, defendants or interested parties in lawsuits in the federal courts with four of those cases making it to the U.S. Supreme court for argument and decision. The Stockbridge-Munsee Mohican leaders entered the arena of receiving formal education and learning to adapt to the ways of the European invaders and subsequently became assertive leaders within the confines of the United States as it was becoming increasingly aggressive towards the removals of the Mohheconnuck people from early contact. That kind of leadership has transcended through the years from 1771 through 2019. The

Stockbridge-Munsee Mohican Leaders continue within the confines of legal battles seemingly endless even today. The continuous fight for legal standing through this current administration will become the legacy of leaders of the most recent past. Modern leaders have been the first participants of National Congress of American Indians, NCAI, in 1944, by Chairman Arvid E. Miller. The Stockbridge-Munsee Tribal Council took on the leadership role of creating the still existing, Great Lake inter-Tribal Council, GLITC, in 1966. Both organizations still exist today and have participants in leadership roles by numerous of the Stockbridge-Munsee Mohican Leaders all along the way. Arvid E. Miller Memorial Library Museum staff including Rainer Posselt, Yvette Granquist and Heather Bruegl are in the process of doing research on each leader up through today to properly represent them. It is a large undertaking to seek information going back through the annals of our History. This kind of project will be an ongoing effort over the next few months involving research and unveiling new information to share with all our Mohican News readers. Mohican News will keep updating the progress of this historic project. Every effort to print notification in our paper and online to keep Membership informed of the upcoming official unveiling event will be made.

## Menominee Vocational Rehabilitation Program Onsite at Stockbridge-Munsee Education Office



On the first Thursday of each month, Antoinette Davids (pictured), Vocational Rehabilitation Career Placement Coordinator, spends time in the Stockbridge-Munsee Education Office to share their program services that are available for free to Native Americans with Disabilities in order to secure, retain, advance or

regain employment.

Davids can assist individuals with creating their own plans to gain entry into the workforce. This program provides services to Federally or State Recognized Native American or Alaskan Natives residing on the Menominee Reservation OR within a 30-mile radius of their Reservation borders.

Antoinette will assist you with assessing your eligibility for services and a Menominee Vocational Rehabilitation Program Counselor will meet with you and assist you in developing your Individualized plan.

Although she is regularly scheduled here on the 1<sup>st</sup> Thursday of each month from 9am-11:30 AM, arrangements can be made to have alternative meeting dates and times.

**Vets cont from page One:** always have, but The Loyalty and pride of the Indians held true. When President Lincoln called for Militia to defend the United States, Stockbridge-Munsee Mohican men were among the first to enlist. Fifty-eight Stockbridge-Munsee Mohican men, and five others married into the tribe from the Brothertown Band of Indians were counted as some of the first to enlist in the civil war in April of 1861. Their letters home showed their commitment to both the United States as well as their respected Stockbridge-Munsee Mohican Nations. Schedler spoke of her interest in researching the fallen soldiers and of her travels to visit and pay respect to many of their gravesites

over the last several years. The battels that Stockbridge-Munsee Mohican Veterans has spanned from the very first through current times, with Schedler being a Veteran of Operation Desert Storm alongside Ten other Mohican Veterans who served. Through the annals of U.S. history, Mohican Veterans have participated and heeded the call to battle every time. Other Veterans were present during this presentation as she shared photos and details of many of their activities they have participated in since they first formed in 1997, including invitations from all over the country. They will also participate in the Annual Veterans Day program held at Bowler High School on November 11th 2019.

### Why puffy coats and car seats don't mix

Puffy winter coats affect how the harness in a car seat fits your child. The extra padding added by a coat makes it impossible to get the harness to fit correctly.

Even though it might feel like the harness is snug, in a crash the extra material will compress, making the harness too loose to be effective. Loose harness straps on a car seat means there's a greater chance that in a collision your child isn't secure, which could lead to injury.

Wearing a coat also makes the car seat harness more difficult to maneuver, causing the harness to get twisted. And let's not forget that the combination of several layers of clothing, a heavy winter coat or snowsuit, and a padded car seat could lead to one overheated kiddo!



### Yes, it's worth the extra effort

It's understandable to want to just leave the coat on. Getting little ones bundled up to brave the cold temperatures can feel like an endlessly complicated task.

The thought of having to go through this each time you get in and out of the car — all while trying to keep yourself warm as well — is daunting. But it's worth the extra effort, even if you're just going for a quick jaunt around the neighborhood. Studies have shown that most crashes occur within 20 minutes or less from home and at relatively slow speeds. Motor vehicle crashes, wherever they occur, are the leading cause of death in children older than 1.

When getting ready to use a car seat in winter, put your child in thin, warm layers such as fleece or Thinsulate. For rear-facing babies in an infant seat, once the child is snug in the harness, layering blankets over the top of the harness works well. For older, rear-facing toddlers or for forward-facing children, once the child is snug in the harness you can put the coat on backward over arms and shoulders to keep them warm until the car's heater kicks in. You can even make a game out of putting on the coat backward! Also, keep a blanket in the car that can be used when the coat comes off.

### Follow these car seat safety guidelines

- For rear-facing seats, the harness height should be at or below the top of the child's shoulder.
- For forward-facing seats, the harness height should be at or above the top of the child's shoulder.
- The harness should fit snugly. Parents should not be able to pinch any slack in the harness at the shoulder. Only one finger should fit snugly between the shoulder and the harness.
- The chest clip should always be at armpit level.

#### Stay warm and stay safe this winter.

4. The limited waiver of sovereign immunity granted and approved through this Resolution does not waive the sovereign immunity of any official, employee, member or agent of the Tribe.
5. Any dispute resolution action against the Tribe, as consented to through this limited waiver of sovereign immunity, shall be brought in the form and venue identified in the Agreement. The law to be applied, if no law is otherwise identified, shall

Instill a life-long habit that is the key to illness prevention: hand-washing. Get the Flu Vaccine. Vaccines are the surest way to prevent the flu. The best time to get a flu vaccine is from October through November, although you can get the vaccine even later during flu season. Get the flu vaccine every year. Flu viruses are constantly changing, and new vaccines are developed each year to protect against new

strains. And you cannot get influenza from getting the vaccination. Clean for Virus Prevention. Use disinfectant when you clean at home, especially in the bathroom and kitchen. Stay away from sponges and rags — studies show they're the number one source of germs in the whole house. If you must use sponges, change them once a week or soak them in bleach for 15 minutes. Practice Cold and Flu Prevention at Work. Hold office meetings in large rooms with plenty of ventilation. Keep some extra space between you and people who are sick, or who sneeze or cough openly. If you share a workstation with others, clean it with antibacterial wipes before you sit down.

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
