Stockbridge-Munsee Community Remembers Robert "Bob" Chicks

Death of Past Tribal President
BOWLER, WISCONSIN: The Stockbridge-Munsee Community suffered a loss when Robert "Bob" Chicks died on January 23, 2020. In remembrance of his past service as a Tribal President and a Councilmember, the Stockbridge-Munsee Community has ordered that flags be flown at half-staff from January 23, 2020 to the time of burial service.

Bob Chicks served as Tribal President from 1997 to 2009 as well as serving as a tribal employee and as a member of the Tribal Council. During his time on Tribal Council, Bob provided leadership and guidance on a wide variety of development projects and other issues. Bob was a driving force on the work to reach a self-paying settlement for the Tribe's New York State land claim through a casino in the Catskills. The Tribe's current Health and Wellness Center and the Pine Hills Clubhouse were built



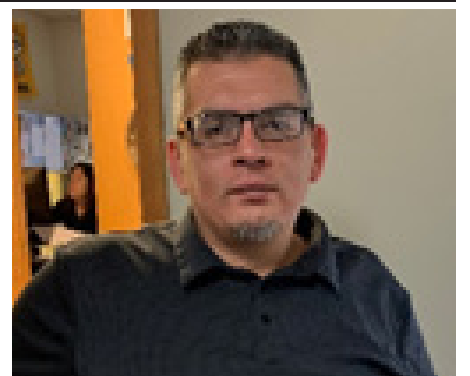
while Bob was Tribal President and construction began on its current Mohican North Star Gaming and Resort facility during his tenure. The Tribe also developed the Little Star gas station and its Mohican LP Gas Company businesses when he was Tribal President. Along with his service to the Tribe, Bob Chicks also took a leadership

Do you know the difference between a cold or flu? Here is a diagram to show you some of the signs and symptoms, along with some remedies to help get rid of it. PICTURE

Over-the-counter pain and fever reducers or decongestants can lessen cold and flu symptoms, but they will not treat the underlying viral infection.

There are many nonprescription products available to manage cold and flu symptoms, including:

- **Tylenol (acetaminophen)**
- **Aspirin**, for people age 19 and older
- **Advil or Motrin (ibuprofen)**
- **Aleve (naproxen)**
- **Sudafed (pseudoephedrine)**
- Cough suppressants, like Robitussin; or expectorants, like Mucinex
- Throat lozenges

Still, these medicines have side effects and can pose a health risk in patients with pre-existing conditions like high blood pressure, heart disease, or allergies.

Despite the lack of scientific evidence, popular herbal remedies include:

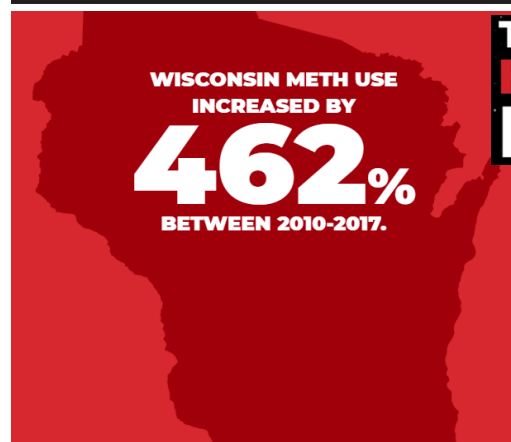
- **Echinacea** Echinacea is used to reduce the duration of a cold or the flu.
- **Elderberry Extract** To reduce congestion and increase perspiration
- **Eucalyptus** To relieve congestion, loosen phlegm, and

- soothe a sore throat
- **Licorice** To treat a sore throat
- **Peppermint (Menthol)** To thin mucus, relieve congestion, and loosen phlegm
- **Slippery Elm** To soothe a sore throat

Cold and Flu Home Remedies

Besides bed rest and fluids, the following home remedies may provide some cold and flu symptom relief by providing hydration, clearing nasal and throat passages, and easing discomfort such as headaches or sore throat:

- Drinking hot green, black, or herbal tea, flavored with lemon or honey, if desired
- Eating hot chicken soup
- Using a humidifier to moisten dry air
- Taking a hot shower or simply sitting in the bathroom with the shower running to create steam
- Bringing a large pan of water to a boil, taking it off the heat, then inhaling the steam by leaning over the water, with or without a towel draped over your head to create a "steam tent"
- Gargling with hot saltwater to ease a sore throat
- Using a netipot or similar device to rinse the nasal passages with saline
- Placing a hot compress on your forehead or nose to help with headache or sinus pain

On the Trail Home



Robert Chicks

Robert Alan Chicks, age 65 of Harbor Springs Michigan walked on unexpectedly Thursday January 23, 2020. Bob was born August 1, 1954 in Shawano Wisconsin to Sarah Wanda (nee Miller) and Clarence Alfred Chicks. His grandparents were Aubyn and Tressie Miller and Alice (nee Davids) and Harry Chicks. Bob was an enrolled member of the Stockbridge-Munsee Band of the Mohican Indians. He was raised in Red Springs until he was five years old when his mother passed away and his father moved the children to Milwaukee. He spent every weekend, holidays, and summer in Red Springs. He graduated from Franklin High school, Franklin, Wisconsin in 1972. He attended Milwaukee Area Technical College and University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee where he was active with the Native American student's groups. He moved back to Red Springs in the early 90's. He started working with his tribe as tribal planner. He served as the Tribal President from 1997 to 2013 with a break for one term. He also served on the Tribal Council. He provided leadership in an important period of tribal development including construction of the Health and Wellness Center, the Casino and hotel, Pine Hills, Little Star and Mohican LP Gas Company. Bob loved his tribe and worked tirelessly on behalf of the Mohican people. He held many positions of leadership on state-wide and national Indian organizations,

including as President of the Great Lakes Inter-Tribal Council, Minneapolis Area Vice-President of the National Congress of American Indians and the Midwest Alliance of Sovereign Tribes. But of all the titles he had, he was most proud of being an enrolled member of the Stockbridge-Munsee Band of the Mohican Indians. Bob met his future wife, Rose Pyant, while they were both in Washington, D.C. Rose is a member of The Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians. They later married in October, 1998. They lived in Red Springs until 2014 when they moved to Michigan. In Michigan, they resided in multiple locations. They finally built their dream home on the Little Traverse Bay Band of Odawa Indians Reservation. Bob worked at the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians Education Department. Bob is survived by his wife Rose, who will love him forever. He is also survived by his brother Terry Chicks, sister Susan Chicks-Wojciechowski (Marc), nephew Nathan (Jamie)Wojciechowski, many grand nephews and nieces, as well as many loving cousins and friends. He was preceded in death by his mother, father and sister, Margie. A Memorial Service was held on Sunday, February 2, at the Orion Event Center in the North Star Casino. Friends were able to call on the family at the Center until the service. Everyone is Welcome! Many families, one Nation.

ARCO WAIVER RESOLUTION-

Motion by Jolene Bowman to adopt resolution 034-20, now therefore be it resolved, the Tribal Council hereby authorizes the Tribal President or, if unavailable, the Vice-President to execute the GSTV Services and Media Equipment Order Agreement; and be it further resolved, that the Tribal Council hereby grants and approves a limited waiver of the Tribe's sovereign immunity solely for the limited purpose of enforcement of this agreement, including the governing law of North Carolina with jurisdiction in the courts located in North Carolina; and be it further resolved, that the waiver of sovereign immunity for the Tribe is also limited to the terms and conditions set forth

below:

1. The limited waiver of the Tribe's sovereign immunity is granted only to and for the benefit of the parties identified as part of the agreement(s) that the Tribe has executed and shall not extend to any other entity or person.
2. The limited waiver of the Tribe's sovereign immunity contained in this Resolution shall be effective only after the parties' officially designated representatives have executed the agreement(s) and shall only be for the term of the agreement(s).
3. Nothing contained in this Resolution shall be deemed consent to levy of any judgment, lien, or attachment upon any property or interest in property of the Stockbridge-Munsee Community.
4. The limited waiver of sovereign immunity granted and approved through this Resolution does not waive the sovereign immunity of any official, employee, member or agent of the Tribe.
5. Any dispute resolution action against the Tribe, as consented to through this limited waiver of sovereign immunity, shall be brought in the form and venue identified in the agreement(s). The law to be applied, if no law is otherwise identified, shall be federal law. Seconded by Marv Malone. Motion carried.

TRIBAL TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PLAN-Willy Miller, Roads Manager

Dare2Know Urges Action

MADISON, Wisc. — February 07, 2020 — February is National Teen Dating Violence Awareness and Prevention Month (TDVAM). Dare2Know is taking to social media to increase awareness of teen dating violence and encourage positive action among Wisconsin youth, their parents, their communities, and across the entire state.

The Dare2Know movement was launched in July 2018 to empower Wisconsin's youth to join the movement to end teen dating violence. Dare2Know seeks to expose – and end – the serious impact of teen dating violence in Wisconsin and long-term effects on youth and society. The purpose is to inform, educate, and inspire youth to rally together in positive ways and promote healthy relationships in their schools and communities. A variety of resources, tools, and activities, including a youth-led Teen Ambassador Program, encourages teens to actively participate in and share their experiences with each other.

About 15% of the Wisconsin population is between the ages of 10-20 years. That means that there are about 872,000 youth in Wisconsin who may be impacted by teen dating violence. The impact of teen dating violence is illustrated through these staggering statistics:

1 in 5 Wisconsin youth – about 174,000 – experience dating violence.

1 in 4 Wisconsin youth in a relationship say they have been called names, harassed, or put down by their partner through mobile devices.

2 in 3 Wisconsin youth who were in an abusive relationship never told anyone about the abuse.

In addition to spreading awareness, Dare2Know will be supporting other teen dating violence prevention organizations and initiatives on social media to increase engagement on the subject of teen dating violence. Topics include how and when to reach out to adult allies, education on warning signs of teen dating violence, and much more using #Dare2Know.

To ensure widespread education, Dare2Know is encouraging Wisconsin youth to join the Teen Ambassador Program (TAP). TAP was created to build a statewide network of teens that support one another in the movement to end teen dating violence.

This program includes a Teen Ambassador toolkit, educational challenges to aid them through the D2K process, and monthly virtual meetups hosted by the D2K Youth Outreach Specialists to connect the Teen Ambassadors to each other and educate them to further promote healthy relationships in their communities.

Steps to obtain an ID to vote explained

Most Wisconsin voters already have some form of ID needed to vote, including a Wisconsin driver license or ID. There is no separate "voter ID" and a federally-compliant REAL ID card is not required for voting purposes. The Wisconsin Elections Commission explains the acceptable options to bring to the polls on its [website](http://www.wisconsin.gov/elections).

The first step for voters looking to get their first Wisconsin ID should be the Wisconsin Department of Transportation Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV) website at [wisconsin.gov/dmv/idcards](http://www.wisconsin.gov/dmv/idcards).

Next, bring the required documents to apply. Certain documents, such as a birth certificate, proof of identity and Wisconsin residency, are necessary to obtain an official Wisconsin ID card (see [wisconsin.gov/identity-list](http://www.wisconsin.gov/dmv/identity-list)). 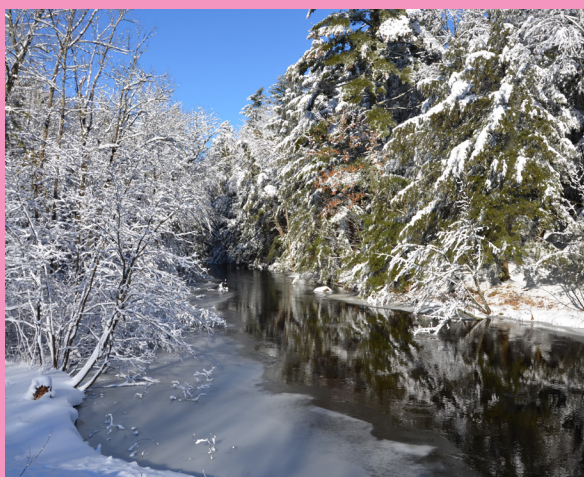
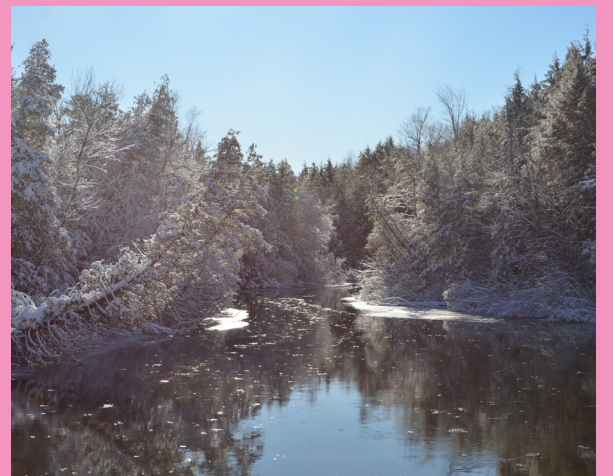

1. The limited waiver of the Tribe's sovereign immunity is granted only to and for the benefit of the parties identified as part of the agreement(s) that the Tribe has executed and shall not extend to any other entity or person.
2. The limited waiver of the Tribe's sovereign immunity contained in this Resolution shall be effective only after the parties' officially designated representatives have executed the agreement(s) and shall only be for the term of the agreement(s).
3. Nothing contained in this Resolution shall be deemed consent to levy of any judgment, lien, or attachment upon any property or interest in property of the Stockbridge-Munsee Community other than funds awarded as part of the grant.
4. The limited waiver of sovereign immunity granted and approved through this Resolution does not waive the sovereign immunity of any official, employee, member or agent of the Tribe.
5. Any dispute resolution action against the Tribe, as consented to through this limited waiver of sovereign immunity, shall be brought in the form and venue identified in the agreement(s). The law to be applied, if no law is otherwise identified, shall be federal law. Seconded by Martin Welch. Motion carried.

The Success Through Recruitment/Retention, Engagement, and Mentorship program in the UW-Madison School of Nursing is designed to help Native American students attain their goal of becoming professional nurses. STREAM students receive peer support, mentorship, academic and financial support. The program is funded by an award from the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) Nursing Workforce Diversity (NWD) Program.

WHO CAN JOIN STREAM?

The STREAM program welcomes current UW-Madison students who self-identify as Native American/American Indian or Alaska Native, have declared nursing as their major field of study, and who meet the academic requirements for Pre-Nursing or the traditional Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) program at UW-Madison.

WHAT DOES BEING A STREAM STUDENT INVOLVE?

If you are accepted into STREAM, you will be asked to:

- Work with STREAM staff to develop an individualized STREAM Plan to support your success,
- Take part in monthly STREAM talking circles with other STREAM students for peer support,
- Connect with your mentor (a Native American Registered Nurse) at least once per month,
- Complete a brief online check-in once per month, and
- Attend workshops (e.g. School of Nursing Learning Center) or other relevant campus offerings (e.g. Native American Center for Health Professions), based on your plan and your interests.

• Receive a stipend of \$400 per month upon meeting all of the above requirements.

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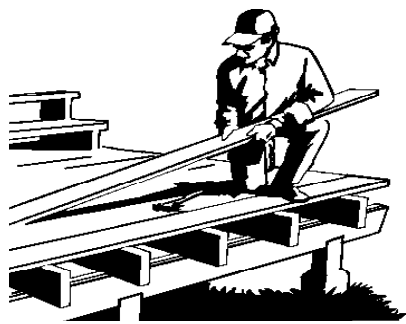
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
