Big things are happening for Native American People in the US. 2022 was a major year for Native People and here are some highlights to the year. From politics to television there is a lot going on in native country. 2022 saw a record number of Native American/Alaska Native political candidates running for federal, state and local office positions. Republican Markwayne Mullin, a citizen of the Cherokee Nation Oklahoma, won a seat in the U.S. Senate. Democrat Peltola, Yup'ik Mary Western Alaska, from was elected to the U.S. House of Representatives. Democrat Sharice Davids, Ho-Chunk from Kansas, won a third term in the U.S. House of Representatives. Cole. Republican Tom Chickasaw from Oklahoma, won an 11th term in the U.S. House of Representatives.

In June, President Joe Biden nominated Chief Mutáwi Mutáhash ("Many Hearts") Marilynn "Lynn" Malerba, the lifetime chief of the Mohegan Indian Tribe in Connecticut, to serve as U.S. treasurer. She now oversees the U.S. Mint, the Bureau of **Engraving and Printing**

Vets cont from page One: that he would be signing an executive order creating a Blue-Ribbon Commission on Veteran Opportunity, to develop new, innovative initiatives to support the more than 300,000 veterans who live in Wisconsin. Shortly thereafter, Gov. Evers signed Executive Order #157 to create the Commission and charged Commission the with identifying gaps in existing services, investment, and reducing barriers economic security, including efforts to expand access to higher education and job training, address insecurity, housing and increase mental and behavioral health support and substance use disorder treatment.

Gov. Evers' Blue Ribbon Commission gathered input from stakeholders, conducted listening consulted sessions, experts. They built innovative sound and recommendations to build a better Wisconsin for veterans. Following release of the the Commission's final report reimburses employers for in September 2022 and based on the Commission's recommendations, Gov. Evers announced a \$10 million investment, funded through the American Rescue Plan Act. in veteran services across the state. This investment included: \$4.5 million to support veteran mental health initiatives, including supporting communitybased programs, increasing access to emergency services, and programs. \$2 million to create a rental assistance Requiring DVA to explore students for homeless program veterans. This was also a recommendation from the Interagency Council Homelessness' "Welcoming Home" report. additional \$1.5 million for State Veterans Home at respite center for veterans

the Veterans Outreach and Recovery Program (VORP), which provides case management and support to veterans and connects veterans to community services, including substance use treatment, housing, education, and mental healthcare. This investment is intended to fund seven positions additional serve veterans across the state. An additional \$1.5 million for county veteran services offices (CVSOs) and Tribal veterans service offices (TVSOs), which help veterans connect to benefits, preventative programming, and family engagement activities. The funding will increase allocations to CVSOs and TVSOs by 100 percent, ensure TVSO payments are not being prorated, and increase payments to part-time CVSOs. An additional \$500,000 for the Wisconsin Department of Workforce Developments' Heroes Program, which provides services to veterans with high barriers employment and certain costs when hiring veteran employees.

To ensure the current and future needs of Wisconsin veterans are evaluated and that DVA can be responsive changing demands, the governor is proposing the following through his 2023-25 budget: Providing \$500,000 general purpose revenue (GPR) to DVA post-9/11 evaluate veteran needs arising from the increase in multiple deployments, higher opportunities expansion at all existing sites of services Veterans the and Recovery Program. Providing funding to DVA Providing \$450,000 GPR Wisconsin to create a master plan in each year as state An for the campus of the support for the peer-run

King to assess the current status of the campus and how the campus can serve veterans. Providing funding to the veterans homes to address their ongoing needs so that each home has adequate resources to provide the best possible care to the most vulnerable veterans in Wisconsin. Supporting the continuation of pilot add-ons to address critical recruitment and retention needs at DVA by providing \$6.7 million in non-GPR funding to the Department of Veterans Affairs support add-ons for several nursing classifications.

Gov. **Evers** remains meeting committed to Wisconsin veterans where they are and making sure they're aware of the services they're entitled to, whether it's mental health preventative access, programming, family engagement, or education benefits through: Doubling the amount of funding to County and Tribal Veterans Services Offices (CVSOs and TVSOs) by providing \$843,600 annually for and **CVSOs** \$253,000 TVSOs. annually for CVSOs and TVSOs play a vital role in connecting veterans to needed services. Providing \$2.8 million (\$1.2 million in fiscal year 24 and \$1.6 million in fiscal year 25) to enable University of Wisconsin System campuses provide services tailored veterans, military personnel, and their families, including achieving the recommended School Certifying Officer (SCO) or expanding improving or and Housing for veteran and military personnel students.

ensure the to center has a reliable, ongoing funding source. Providing 7.0 FTE SEG positions and \$957,200 SEG over the biennium to expand Veterans Outreach the and Recovery Program, which provides outreach mental health services and support to veterans who may have a mental health condition or substance use disorder. The goal of the program is to reduce the suicide rate among veterans and to provide veterans access to mental health supports, housing, and other services.

Gov. Evers is also investing in further securing the Wisconsin ability of veterans to have access to the services and devices they need post-service by: Providing \$250,000 for a grant program to aid Wisconsin dog trainers in attaining Assistance Dog International accreditation, specifically for providing post-traumatic disorder training to better serve veterans. Expanding access to the Assistance for Needy Veterans Grant program by including medical devices as an allowable expense under the program and increasing the annual and lifetime caps for support under this program.

In his budget proposal, Gov. President Joe Biden this year his commitment to the sovereignty of Native American tribes, nations and communities. He also injected historic levels of funding into Indian Country and gave tribes a greater U.S. voice in policy and decisionmaking. Wisconsin's State-Tribal Relations special committee unanimously voted to advance a bill that would update a 1989 law that requires primary and secondary public schools to teach students about the history, culture and treaty rights of Wisconsin's Native Americans December 13 In May, the U.S. Interior Department released the first volume of a federal probe into the Indian boarding school program. Ordered by Secretary Deb Haaland, a citizen of the Laguna Pueblo in New Mexico, the investigation found that between 1819 and 1969, the federal government "operated or supported" 408 boarding schools in 37 states or former territories, including 21 in Alaska and seven in Hawaii. The report counted 500 student deaths and discovered graves at 53 schools; those numbers are expected to rise as the probe continues. The report recommended further research federal boarding school

abuses, investigations into tribal health disparities and support for Indigenous revitalization language programs. In November, Secretary Haaland signed Secretarial Order reiterated 3404, declaring "squaw," a historic term for Native American women, to be derogatory and setting up a task force to remove the word from 650 geographic features across the Throughout the year, the department consulted with almost 70 tribes and announced in September an agreement on new names.

Natives in 2022 took to the big screen in big fashion. 2022 saw Season 2 of Reservation Dogs, The first TV series ever to feature all-Indigenous writers and directors and an almost entirely North American Indigenous cast, it won an impressive number of awards. Dark Winds, a crime drama set in the Navajo Nation and starring veteran Lakota actor Zahn McClarnon, was shot at the first Indigenous-owned film studio in New Mexico. The summer film hit Prey, a prequel to Disney's Predator series, starred a mostly Native American cast and was released in English and Comanche language versions. All these big steps for native people in 2022 are setting up for big thing in 2023, like the release of Marvel's Echo, starring Stockbridge-Munsee/Menominee actress into Alaqua Cox.

Though Emily loves working with people, it is the community building aspect that Emily is so passionate about. Crappie Junction can be found on Facebook, YouTube, and many of your favorite social media platforms. This online space allows for outreach such as

Throughout the year, they partner with companies and brands from the fishing world to participate in fishing events and expos where they get to meet with and interview some of the top anglers in the sport. College Tribal Celebrates Through Restoration KESHENA. Wisc. - The In College of Menominee Nation (CMN) will celebrate its 30th anniversary with the theme of Restoring Nations Through Education, highlighting milestones in its history.

The college's anniversary coincides with the 50th anniversary of the Menominee Restoration Act of 1973, which reversed an earlier act of Congress to terminate Menominee's status as а federally recognized tribe. CMN's President Christopher Caldwell says the college has a mission and tradition of advancing restoration through its degree and certificate programs.

"Both anniversaries are significant to our college's work to restore sovereignty and traditional culture," said Caldwell. "We will reflect on the impact of tribal termination policies and celebrate the progress of restoration over the past half-century. of the land, which became a county land of Wisconsin, and cut off federal funds for essential services.

Extreme poverty and social disorder forced the Tribe of to sell a sizable portion of the land it retained to help the people through a tough time. When the Menominee learned of the plans for an artificial lake and luxury homes for non-Indians, they aggressively protested the project.

In 1972, the Determination of Rights and Unity for Menominee Stockholders (DRUMS) blocked project, a massive victory that ignited the movement to restore federal recognition with a satellite campus in and the sovereign status of the Tribe.
