<u>Administrative Updates</u>

- The clinic implemented a 105L lease. This lease requires IHS to pay the Tribe rent for the Clinic building because the building is used to offer health care services. The lease agreement provides the Tribe \$1.4 million dollars a year, this is approximately \$1.2 million more than the standard M&I funding method.
- Pharmacy is implementing the 340B program from HRSA. This is a pharmacy program to allow the clinic to purchase medications at a reduced rate because we are a FQHC (Federally quali- • 10/14 Safety Fair @ Pubfied Health Center). Obtaining a Veteran Wisconsin ID in Being a veteran can bring perks such as exclusive discounts and special services from businesses, but very often obtaining these perks requires showing proof of service. One way to prove veteran status is to present a discharge paper (form DD214), which all veterans receive when separating from the military. However, carrying document this around is both impractical and an identity-theft risk. After establishing eligibility, veterans can go to the Wisconsin DMV to get the identifier put on their license. If renewing a license there is no extra charge but there is a fee if requesting a replacement outside of the renewal dates. Remember to take a certified birth certificate with you to the DMV. more difficult to use. 

In 1734, John Sergeant, Christian, began a mission to assimilate the Mohican people living in Wnahktukuk, present-day Stockbridge. In 1742, he built the Mission House on Prospect Hill. Eventually, it was moved to 19 Main Street, where it is maintained by the Trustees of Reservations.

Stockbridge, known as "IndianTown,"soonboasted church and school. а Ancestral Indigenous land can be found along Main Street, including the town cemetery, or burial ground,

where Sergeant, a Mohican chief, and two Stockbridge Indian women are buried. According to Wilson, the local skyline not only included English houses but Mohican structures as well, representing an interrelationship between tradition and the new culture.

"There was no ownership of land for the Stockbridge(-Munsee) people," Wilson said of the vast areas inhabited by the tribe and shared with other communities. "They lived on the land; they stewarded the land, but they didn't own it."

Although many Mohicans had served alongside colonists in the Revolutionary War, they

were eventually pushed out of the Stockbridge area. "The tribe was forced off of the Select Board, they were excommunicated said of the tribe. "Everything this town was set up for taken from them."

By 1783, the community had New York to live among the Oneida Nation. There. in New Stockbridge, the way to protect it for future tribe thrived, but not for long. Local pressure to remove Native Americans from New York's borders forced another relocation in Shawano County, Wis. Nutrition: Food Safety

Food poisoning (also called foodborne illness or foodborne disease) is by caused by consuming food contaminated with certain bacteria and viruses. Food safety refers to the best ways to handle, prepare, and store food to prevent illness.

Food safety rules

Follow these basic safety rules to help keep food safe and avoid illness.

Clean: Wash your hands frequently and clean surfaces touched by food. Germs can spread all over the kitchen, such as on cutting boards, knives, counter tops, sponges, and towels.

Separate: Keep raw foods—such as raw meat, poultry, and seafood—and their juices away from other foods. Germs spread from one food product to another.

Cook: Cook foods to the right temperature. Foods are properly cooked when they are heated for a long enough time and the internal temperature is high enough to kill harmful germs. Always use a thermometer to make sure meat, poultry, and fish reach a safe minimum cooking temperature.

Chill: Refrigerate food promptly. Germs can quickly multiply when food is left at room temperature. FDA recommends refrigerating food within than two hours. Refrigerate it within one hour if it's 90°F or above (such as in a hot car).

Refrigerator safety

Cold temperatures slow the spread of harmful germs. Use these tips to make sure you're storing foods the right way:

- Check the settings with an appliance thermometer. Your refrigerator should be at 40°F or below. Your freezer should be at 0°F or below.
- Cook or freeze fresh poultry, fish, ground meats, and organ and variety meats (such as, heart, kidney, liver and tongue) within two days. Cook or freeze beef, veal, lamb, or pork within three to five days.
- Securely wrap perishable food, such as meat and poultry, to help maintain quality and prevent meat juices from getting onto other food.
- If freezing meat or poultry in its original package, wrap the package again with heavy-duty foil or freezer wrap.

Eating out

More than half of foodborne outbreaks are linked to restaurants. Follow these tips to protect yourself when you eat out:

- Send your food back if it's not fully cooked. Certain foods, such as meat, seafood, poultry and eggs, need to be at a temperature high enough to kill harmful germs.
- Put your leftovers in the fridge within two hours of eating, or one hour if the temperature is above 90°F (such as in a hot car). Reheat your leftovers to 165°F.
- If you get food poisoning, and you think it's linked to a restaurant, report your illness to your local health department.






