Miller began to show significant promise during the latter part of middle

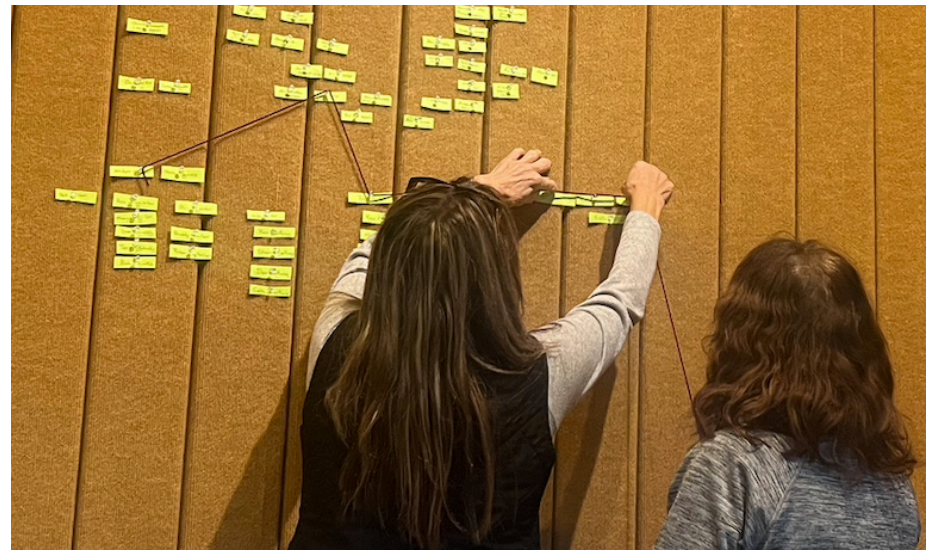

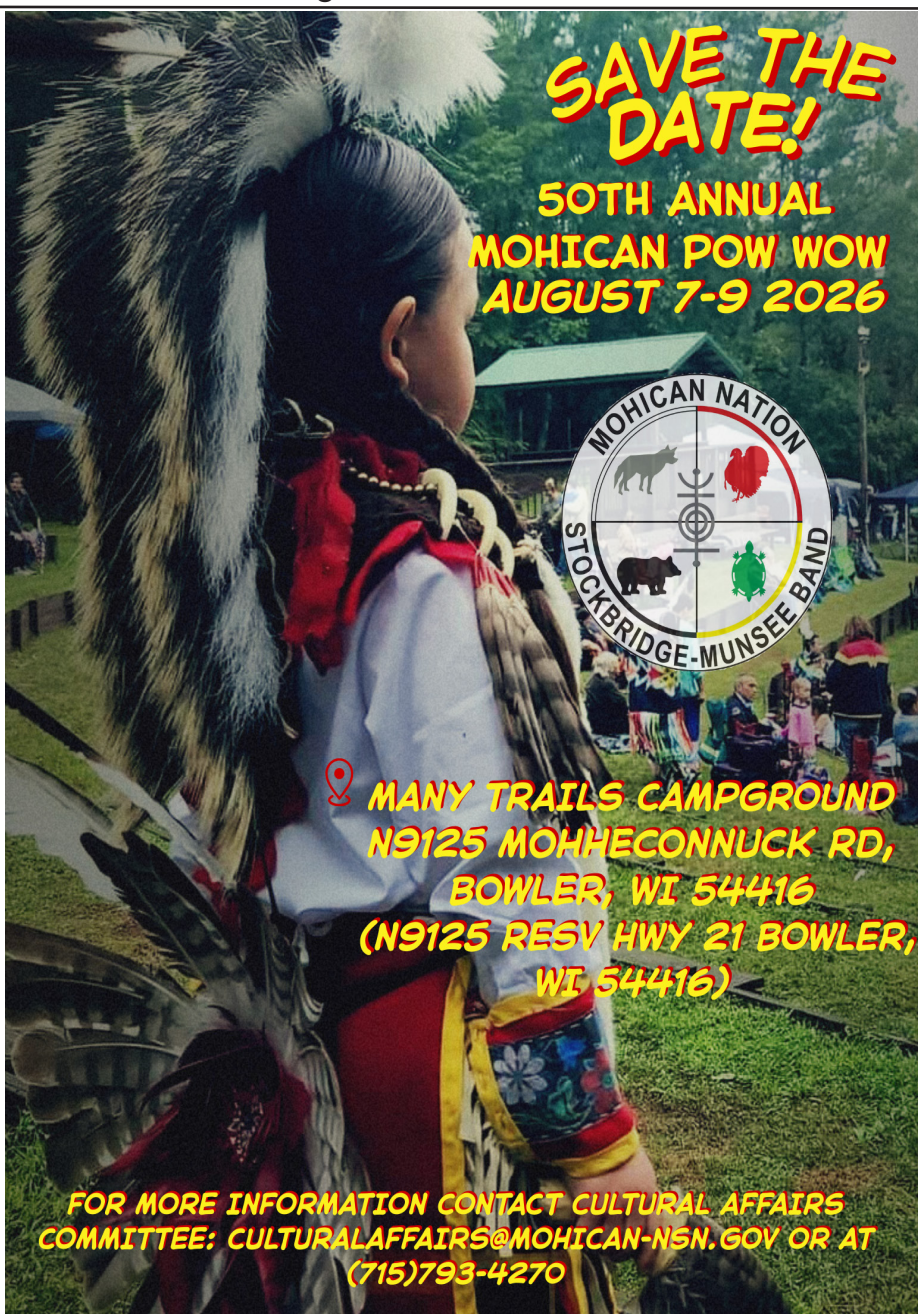

Spring is in the Air

Stockbridge-Munsee Forestry Department

It looks like spring is right around the corner! As the snow begins to melt, there are a few things we all should remember:

The forest road system is valuable, and in an effort to protect access for everyone, spring breakup road restrictions will be going into effect soon. The Forestry and Roads Departments closely monitor weather conditions to choose dates that protect the roads while allowing them to remain open to Tribal use for as long as possible. Watch for a posting of when these restrictions will be enacted at any Tribal posting location or in email. This is usually sometime from mid-March to early-May.

Spring road closures often coincides with the timeless tradition of collecting maple sap. If any enrolled members wish to use motor vehicles on logging roads to collect sap during this period; remember to contact the Forestry Department for your permit.

As the forest starts to green up, remember the restrictions on cutting, or trimming, of oak trees go into effect April 1st. A lot of effort has been done to reduce the prevalence of the oak wilt disease and we all can help do our part to protect this important resource.

Finally, free-use firewood permits expired March 15th, so please contact the Forestry Department if you need one for this coming year.

REMINDER

Solid Waste and Recycling Voucher Reimbursement Program

Tribal members that pay property taxes in the townships of Red Springs and Bartelme will now be responsible to pay for their garbage and recycling charges listed on their tax statement. The tribal member can then complete and submit a voucher for reimbursement, based on the criteria below:

Eligibility for reimbursement:

- Must be an enrolled tribal member of the Stockbridge-Munsee Community.
- Must live within the historic boundaries of the Stockbridge-Munsee Community tribal land (within the townships of Bartelme and Red Springs).
- Must own a residence that receives garbage and recycling services.
- Must have the most recent tax bill showing charges for garbage and recycling services; OR an invoice from a waste management company if contracted individually.

Reimbursement Voucher:

- The reimbursement voucher will be for a one-time payment per calendar year of your garbage/recycling fees not to exceed \$150.00.
- Only one voucher will be given to an individual no matter how many properties are owned.
- The individual applying for reimbursement must fill out a voucher form and show proof of property ownership (ex. name on tax bill).

Those that qualify will be required to obtain a voucher and return the completed form to Ecology Department by **April 15th** of any given year. Vouchers can be obtained through the Ecology Department.

- BOBCAT 4 Can be male or Female.
- FISHER 4 Can be male or Female.
- OTTER 4 When the number of female otters reaches 4, the season will be closed.

Only tribal members may trap.

The season for trapping fur-bearing animals shall be October 15 – April 15.

Trappers must report their trappings with the Conservation/Ecology Departments within 24 hours of the trapping.

Once the quota has been met, the Conservation/Ecology Departments shall post such notices at the Little Star Convenience Store, the Conservation Department and the Tribe's web site.

Library from page One: visitors can add their direct family line and connect to names already on the wall. Over time, individual lines begin to reveal a larger picture: just how closely woven our community truly is.

In our community, one of the first questions we often ask is, "Who are your people?" That question does more than identify family, it establishes belonging, shared history, and responsibility to one another. The Kinship Wall translates that everyday exchange into a living, visual form.

The installation was conceptualized as a way to represent this cultural practice in a tangible way. Developed in collaboration with community members, the project invites visitors to participate in building the work over time.

"It's All Relative" is not

intended to be a formal genealogy chart or official record. Instead, it is a community-built artwork that will continue to grow and shift over time. Anyone tribally connected is welcome to participate by adding their direct family line and connecting to existing names rather than repeating them.

The installation also coincides with expanded public hours at the Library & Museum.

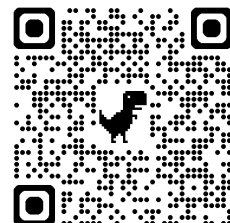

engagement. "If you choose to serve, you need to be involved and contribute," she said. Alphia was presented with a Tribal Blanket for her years of service on Monday March 2, 2026.

Her path into education began when she was accepted into a program through the Menominee Education Project designed to increase the number of Native educators. Through that opportunity, Creapeau earned her Bachelor of Arts degree in education and began a career that would shape the lives of countless students. Creapeau started by substitute teaching in the math department at the Menominee Indian School District. She was later hired by Menominee Tribal School (MTS) as a middle school teacher, where she soon became the science teacher. In addition to teaching, she coached several sports for both boys and girls and later served as assistant principal.

While teaching at MTS, Creapeau continued her own education, earning a Master of Science in Education with an emphasis in environmental science. During that time, she also developed a science curriculum based on Menominee culture, helping connect students to their heritage while learning scientific concepts.

At one point, Creapeau stepped away from teaching to explore administration and was hired as the Stockbridge-Munsee Tribal Administrator. During that time, she earned a Master of Science in Business. Despite the opportunity, she eventually realized her true calling was in education and returned to the classroom.

Her passion for education continued when she was recruited to help develop

a new program at the College of Menominee Nation (CMN) designed to support students who were new to college. Creapeau played a key role in building the program and guiding students through their academic journeys. She later joined the Teacher Education Department at CMN and eventually became the department's director. Under her leadership, the program became the college's first bachelor's degree program. Graduates from the program are certified by the state and eligible to teach in schools throughout Wisconsin.

During her time at CMN, Creapeau also fulfilled a requirement in her contract to pursue a doctorate. She earned her Ph.D. in Educational Leadership, further strengthening her ability to guide and mentor future educators. Her work left a lasting impact on many students. Not long ago, she ran into a former student who told her she had changed her life and thanked her with a hug—one of many moments that confirmed the importance of her work.

After more than 30 years in education, Creapeau began preparing for retirement and accepted a position as Human Services Director for the Stockbridge-Munsee Community. In that role, she gained a deeper understanding of the many services the tribe offers its members. Later, when the Enrollment Manager position opened, she applied and found a new way to serve the community.

Helping individuals trace their family trees became one of the most meaningful parts of her work. By reconnecting people with their relatives and heritage, she helped many develop a stronger sense of belonging. Creapeau credits

teamwork with helping the department grow and improve its services. Together with her staff, they worked to organize and implement forward-thinking, community-based improvements.

Outside of her career, family has always been central to Creapeau's life. She has been married to Ray Creapeau Jr. for 45 years. Together they raised three children: Geraldine "Biscuit" Sanapaw, Lyle "Little Man" Welch Jr., and Ray "Baby Ray" Creapeau III. The family has grown to include 11 grandchildren and six great-grandchildren, as well as daughters-in-law Georgia and Tiana and son-in-law Kenny.

In retirement, Creapeau plans to spend more time doing the things she enjoys most. Gardening is one of her favorite pastimes, along with preserving the harvest

through canning, freezing, and dehydrating. She also enjoys landscaping her yard and continues to serve on the Stockbridge-Munsee Constitution Committee and the Gresham Scholarship Committee. She plans to continue researching genealogy for family and friends and looks forward to spending time with her grandchildren and siblings. As she enters this new chapter, Creapeau reflects on the many people she has met along the way. "It has been a long ride, but a good one," she said. "All the people I have met and worked with have taught me how to appreciate life." In retirement, she hopes to focus on caring for family and friends and enjoying the freedom to do what she wants, when she wants.

record for most wins in a school, qualifying for youth state several times. By the time he entered high school, he had a clear goal: to leave a lasting mark on the Wittenberg-Birnamwood wrestling program and during his high school years, Miller did exactly that.

He finished his high school career with an impressive 180–38 overall record, including a dominant 54-win senior season. His final trip to the state tournament ended with a third-place finish, capping off one of the most successful careers in program history. Miller also qualified for the state tournament as a freshman and placed fourth during his junior season, demonstrating consistency and competitiveness at the highest level of Wisconsin high school wrestling. Along the way, he etched his name into the Chargers' record books. Miller currently holds the school

record for most wins in a single season and ranks among the program's leaders in career wins, pins in a season, and career pins.

When he's not in the wrestling room, Miller enjoys spending time outdoors, especially fishing. "Every time I have time I like to get on the lake," Miller said. "Even if it's only for a couple of hours." Miller also spends much of his summers working in commercial roofing, traveling across the United States for projects.

This fall, Miller plans to continue both his academic and athletic career at the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse, where he will wrestle while pursuing a business degree. As he prepares to take the next step in both wrestling and life, Miller leaves behind a legacy of hard work, dedication, and success for future Chargers to follow.

From Survival to Celebration: 50 Years of the Mohican Powwow

Each summer, the steady rhythm of drums echoes across the powwow grounds in Bowler as dancers in colorful regalia step into the arena. Families gather under tents, elders share stories, and visitors watch as traditions passed down for generations come to life. This year's celebration also marks an important milestone: 50 years of openly honoring a tradition that earlier generations fought to preserve.

This gathering is the annual powwow of the Stockbridge-Munsee Community—a celebration that reflects both cultural pride and a history of survival. While powwows today are vibrant public events, there was a time when Native American tribes across the United States, including those in Wisconsin, were discouraged or even forbidden from holding such ceremonies. For centuries, Native nations held ceremonial gatherings long before Wisconsin became a state. These events included singing, dancing, storytelling, and feasting, and served important cultural and spiritual purposes.

For the Mohican people, ancestors of the present-day Stockbridge-Munsee tribe, cultural gatherings became even more important after their forced migrations from the eastern United States to the Midwest during the 18th and 19th centuries. In the late 1800s, U.S. government policies sought to assimilate Native Americans into European-American society. Officials believed traditional ceremonies prevented Native communities from adopting Western customs. In 1883, federal authorities created rules known as the Indian Offenses Code, enforced by agents of the Bureau of Indian Affairs. These regulations banned or restricted many Native religious ceremonies and dances. Native people who continued to hold traditional gatherings risked punishment, including fines, jail time, or the loss of food rations. Government fears increased after violent conflicts such as the Wounded Knee Massacre, when the U.S. military suppressed a Native spiritual movement. Officials worried that large gatherings might lead to resistance.

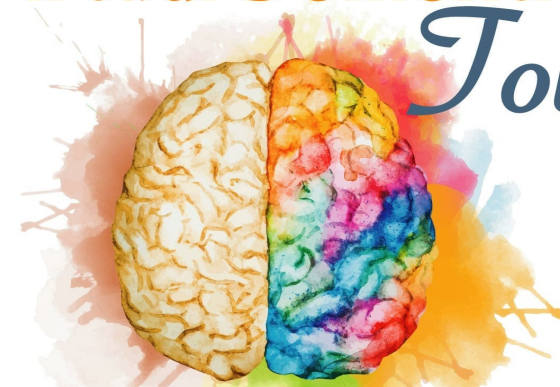
Families quietly passed down songs, dances, and drum rhythms to younger generations. These quiet acts of preservation helped ensure the traditions would survive.

Federal policies began to change in 1934 with the passage of the Indian Reorganization Act, which allowed tribes greater self-governance and encouraged cultural renewal. After World War II, powwows became larger and more public events across the country. Native veterans often helped organize gatherings that honored military service and celebrated tribal identity.

By the mid-20th century, powwows had become a central tradition among Native communities throughout Wisconsin and the Midwest. Today, the 50th Annual Mohican Powwow hosted by the Stockbridge-Munsee

Community in Bowler is quickly approaching. The event welcomes dancers, singers, artists, and visitors from across the region. The powwow will feature traditional dance competitions, drum groups, Native craft vendors, and cultural demonstrations. While the event is festive, it also serves as a reminder of the resilience of Native culture and the generations who worked to preserve it. As the grand entry begins and the drums start to beat, the powwow arena becomes more than a gathering place—it becomes a living symbol of history, endurance, and community. For many tribal members, the powwow represents a connection to ancestors who kept these traditions alive during years when practicing them could bring punishment. This year we celebrate 50 years of our tribe having this sacred right back.

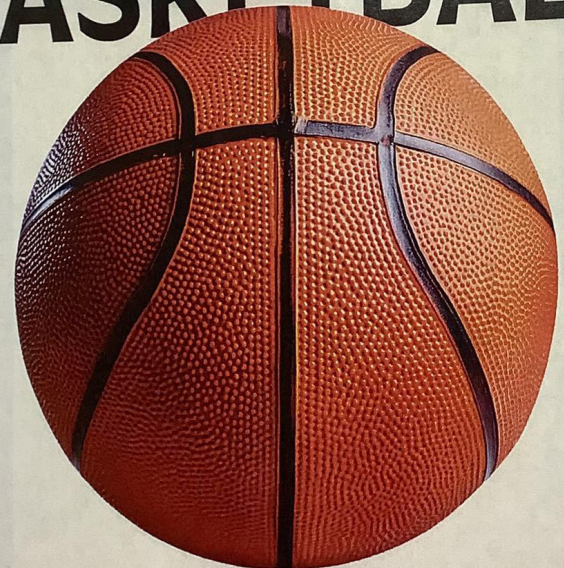

April Make & Take

Mini Frittata Sheet Pan Squares with Ham and Cheese

Ingredients:

- 10 large eggs
- ½ cup milk or unsweetened almond milk
- 1 cup chopped cooked ham
- ½ cup shredded cheddar cheese
- ¼ cup chopped green onions
- Salt and pepper to taste
- Cooking spray or olive oil for pan

Instructions:

1. Preheat oven to 375°F (190°C) and line a sheet pan with parchment paper.
2. In a large bowl, whisk together eggs, milk, salt, and pepper.
3. Stir in ham, cheese, and green onions.
4. Pour mixture into prepared pan and bake for 20–25 minutes until set.
5. Cool slightly, then cut into squares. Serve warm or store for meal prep.

Be It Further Resolved, that the Tribal Council hereby grants and approves a limited waiver of the Tribe's sovereign immunity solely for the limited purpose of enforcement of this agreement, including the resolution of disputes and the enforcement of determinations or awards against the Tribe; and

Be It Finally Resolved, that the waiver of sovereign immunity for the Tribe is also limited to the terms and conditions set forth below:

1. The limited waiver of the Tribe's sovereign immunity is granted only to and for the benefit of the parties identified as part of the agreement(s) that the Tribe has executed and shall not extend to any other entity or person.
2. The limited waiver of the Tribe's sovereign immunity contained in this Resolution shall be effective only after the parties' officially designated representatives have executed the agreement(s) and shall only be for the term of the agreement(s).
3. Nothing contained in this Resolution shall be deemed consent to levy of any judgment, lien, or attachment upon any property or interest in property of the Stockbridge-Munsee Community.
4. The limited waiver of sovereign immunity granted and approved through this Resolution does not waive

the sovereign immunity of any official, employee, member or agent of the Tribe.

Any dispute resolution action against the Tribe, as consented to through this limited waiver of sovereign immunity, shall be brought in the form and venue identified in the agreement(s). The law to be applied, if no law is otherwise identified, shall be federal law.

Not to exceed monthly funds for a term of 36 months. Seconded by Ellie Kazik.

Roll Call: Terrance yes, Ellie yes, Crystal yes, Willy no (*we should never waive our sovereignty*), and Rainer yes. Resolution adopted.
